### POLICE BENEFIT FUND IS TICKLISH PROBLEM

"Old" and "Young" Members of Force Have Differing Opinions—Means Much to Organization.

The police force is having a hot old time over the elections of the police benefit fund committee. This "fund" has been a mighty sore spot for many years among members of the force. The fight that is now on is practically between the "old" and "young" members. The committee is elected annually and consists of one inspector, one sergeant and a man from each division. Heretofore it has been the custom for the inspectors to choose one of their own number and allow the sergeant and a man from each division. The members of the board elected by the force as a body.

On Monday the inspectors decided upon Inspector Stephen as their representative. The young men, however, decided upon a representative of their own and chose Inspector Duncan as the fit and proper person to look after their interests. Inspector Duncan decided to become their candidate. When Inspector Stephen heard this yesterday he resigned, and up to date Duncan is the man.

Going back to some time has been in bad shape. That is, it was not strong enough to permit the retiring of a large number of men who are entitled to their pensions, and their retirement would have been for the betterment of the force. The city council has agreed to come to the rescue of the fund to the extent of \$10,000, providing the proper legislation is granted. This sum is being granted for the purpose of allowing the police commissioners to retire about 25 members of the force whose usefulness faded many moons ago.

As stated before, if the \$10,000 city grant goes thru, some 25 men and officers will be instructed to get their pension cheques from the city treasurer. Now there is not much secret as to who these will be, and this is where this special bone of contention comes in.

The older members, who should have been retiring, or filling other positions, were not retired, and some of them were more than anxious to break away. They have been paying into the "fund" right along, but their pension will be no longer when they retire next year than it would have been some years ago, but they have been drawing pay, some of them increased pay, in the meantime.

It is expected that Cavalier Dominick A. Alessandro of Boston, general president of the International Italian Labor Union, who was knighted by the King of Italy last summer as one of the prominent Italians of America who had rendered meritorious services to his country, will be present to address an organization meeting of the Italian laborers in Toronto Friday night.

Edward Rayner pleaded guilty to stealing a bicycle so that he might get into jail. He was remanded for a week.

### S.P.S. CONQUER MEDS IN BATTLE OF SNOW

Many Panes of Glass in University Buildings Shattered by Belligerents.

Monday afternoon the snow-covered lawns in front of the Medical College and School of Science were black with students, of whom upwards of 600 indulged in a fierce battle with snowballs.

The crash of glass was one of the intermittent noises that characterized the proceedings, and after peace was restored it was found that about 30 panes of glass in the engineering building and upwards of 20 window panes in the medical building were smashed. All the trouble commenced when the fourth year medics went out to the front of the building to have a group photo taken for "The Sunday World." A little crowd of S.P.S. men noticed the doings across the way and thought it would be a good plan to disturb the photographic poses of the fledgling doctors. But the engineers didn't find things quite so easy as they had anticipated. There happened to be not a few second year medics on their way to the dissecting room and they having taken in the situation at a glance immediately came to the assistance of their seniors, with the result that the tables were turned on the attacking party, who rushed pell-mell back into their beloved "school." The complete front of the S.P.S. building was rigid with snow bullets.

But the science men didn't keep under cover very long, for set squares and thumb tacks have made the attractiveness when a light is on with the medics. Consequently two minutes later a crowd of howling students rushed out of the north door of the engineering building and opened hostilities in earnest with the battle cry of "Tolke oke." But the medics, now aroused by third and first year men, rushed forward with "Epistaxis, Prophylaxis," ringing in their ears, and for 15 minutes victory hung in the balance.
