

KAISER IS CONFIDENT Tells German Sailors Subs Are Playing a Decisive Part in the War. Amsterdam, Nov. 15.—The German Em-peror, according to a Berlin despatch, ad-dressing the crews of the U-boat cruisers in the Adriatic, and referring to the de-voyage of three or four weeks was now an every-day occurrence, and declared that development of the U-boats had not reached its highest point. He expressed gratification at the amount of tonnage sunk in the Mediterranean, which, he said, showed that the U-boats had ful-filled what had been expected of them. Submarine warfare would have a decla-ive part in the final outcome of the war, fi and would not be stopped until the enemy was vanguished.
