HIGH LEVEL OF MERCURY IN FRESHWATER FISH

Question No. 792-Mr. Beatty:

- 1. Is the government aware of any water systems in Canada that have an abnormally high level of mercury in freshwater fish and, if so, what are their names?
- 2. Have the pollution sources been identified and, if so, in each case, what action was taken by the government to control the source and with what results?
- 3. With regard to the mercury levels in sediments, what has been the result of government action to control mercury pollution?
- 4. What are the major pollution sources of mercury in Canada that are not under government regulations whether it be the Clean Air Act or the Fisheries Act?
- 5. Are mine tailings being dumped directly into Canadian waters and, if so (a) by what companies (b) what are the monitoring procedures used in Canada to monitor tailings in comparison to the state of the art (c) what are the monitoring procedures used in each case (d) are efforts being made in Canada for the reclamation of land on mine tailing sites?
- 6. Have (a) medical (b) social services been provided by the government to each community that has been reported to consume considerable amounts of mercury-contaminated fish and, if so, what are they?
- 7. Did the government propose the establishment of a national park as a solution to better the conditions of the people of Whitedog and Grassy Narrows and, if so, for what reason?
- 8. Has the government ever used epidemiological evidence to prosecute a polluting company in Canada?
- 9. Would the current discharge of mercury be reduced if all process water contaminated with mercury were to receive full recycling treatment?
