year has conducted in New Brunswick over 4,000 meetings and expended over \$6,000 for the advancement of the temperforefront of all organizations working directly or indirectly in New Brunswick for the promotion of temperance.

We have at present 71 lodges in active work with a membership of 2850. The gain in the due-paying membership, which is our actual strength, has been eminently satisfactory. The tax received in 1904, the year previous to the one in which the present grand secretary assumed office, was \$360.00 on an average membership of 1125. In 1905 it was \$441-60 on a membership of 1380. In 1906, \$538.16 was received on a membership of 1682. This year the tax paid is \$669.04 on an average membership of 2094. It will thus be seen that we have maintained the same per cent increase as in the two previous years.
