MOVEMENT FOR TOTAL PROHIBITION IN STATES UNTIL AFTER WAR

The following circular is being sent to the press and citizens of the United States:

Whereas: In the present critical situation the drink traffic has become a greater menace than ever to our country, in that it is found to be the basis of practically every breach of loyalty, and whereas: Our communities are more menaced today through the activities arising therefrom, and

Whereas: In justice to them and protection to ourselves from abuses of their statutory privileges, be it

Resolved: That we petition the President of the United States of America to use the power vested in him by law to prohibit the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors in our country and possessions for the duration of the war, and be it further

Resolved: That copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the several press associations for publication, and that we ask the loyal citizens of the country

to join with us at once in concerted action to this end, directing their attention to the beneficial effects of prohibition as instituted in the warring countries of Europe.

ALLIED PARLIAMENT WILL PLAY BIG ROLE

Means of Preventing International Conflicts; Be Permanent Union of Free Nations

Paris, May 12.—The results obtained at the recent war council held in Paris were highly satisfactory on all points, and the American government has been informed concerning the discussions, according to Jules Cambon, general secretary to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This conference was attended by Premier Lloyd George, Admiral Sir John R. Jellicoe, Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig and Major-General Sir William R. Robertson, representing Great Britain; Rear-Admiral William S. Sims, representing the United States, and other military and naval leaders.

"More and more it is becoming evident that the future conduct of the war is going to depend upon America, the moral, material, military and naval forces of which constitute factors of the very highest importance," said M. Cambon today.

"Owing to conditions in Russia, activity upon the eastern front may be somewhat slackened by reason of Russia's inner problems, but the action of America gives us advantages offsetting what we might risk losing on the eastern side. It indicates the growing role that President Wilson and America are called upon to play in the final solution."

Referring to the recent congress of the Allied nations in Paris, M. Cambon said "It is an illustration of what President Wilson called an association of free and democratic nations against autocracy."

M. Ribot suggested that the next meeting of the inter-Allied parliament should be held at Petrograd. This could be significant, because this is the latest centre of democratic action would be the seat of a parliament representing the liberal nations. The parliament of the Allies is destined later to play an important role in international affairs. Heretofore arbitration has been accepted as the chief means for reconciling international difficulties and has been set up with that end in view. But arbitration presupposes a common basis of law. That the parliament of the Allied nations will in time formulate a means for averting conflicts and thus avoid the necessity of having to resort to arbitration. "In time the existence of the inter-Allied parliament will become the means of preventing international conflicts and may constitute a permanent union of free nations."

EIGHT WAYS IN WHICH WOMAN CAN MAKE MONEY AT HOME

In a series of letters on the problem of "Making Ends Meet on a Small Income," in Pictorial Review for May, appears the following timely contribution:

Until the high cost of living problem is solved, one must keep on living. Even by most clever planning, a family of four cannot be supported adequately on \$100 a year. Thousands of wives are glorifying their "standing" instead of hurting it, by helping their husbands increase their income. Below are eight actually-tried and successful plans.

A California woman sent cards, stating she would make buttonholes at 2 cents each. Hurried and affluent mothers responded at once. Her work was neat. She made two average buttonholes in ten minutes—24 cents an hour, \$120 a day for the five hours a day she could spare.

An Illinois wife had a large back yard. She specialized in cucumbers. She with her two little boys, kept the vines in fine condition. Summer cucumbers for salad, smaller fall ones for pickles were her stock. What she did not sell, she put up in glass jars attractively. These sold readily for 50 cents per quart. She netted an average of \$25 per month.

A California wife made round, heart-shaped, and animal spiced sugar cookies, tied neatly in wax-paper, a dozen to a package, 15 cents a dozen. She began with a small oven on her gas-stove, and in two years needed and bought a "baker-size" range. She does all her work in the mornings, and clears \$40 to \$60 a month.

Why not rabbit-raising? An Iowa

wife in a small town found this fine pay. Feed only alfalfa dry and rolled barley. With several bucks and 150 does, \$75 to \$100 per month has been cleared by her. Small capital needed, as a very few will soon "start business" on a paying basis.

A Connecticut wife advertised herself as a skilled fruit canner. Her pay was 40 cents an hour, or one-fourth of fruit canned. The share plan gave her enough fruit for her family of five, and often she had "extras" to sell for special occasions. Result, plenty of good fruit free, and \$15 to \$25 per month cash.

A sweet little wife in New Jersey "adores" dainty laundry work. She makes a specialty of laundering beautiful underwear, babies' and children's dresses, chiffon and crepe de Chine waists. Her "standing" is of the best. Her winter work averaged \$15 to \$20; in summer she makes as high as \$55.

The husband of a California woman made her a fine loan. She devoted her spare time to learning how to weave, and how to create special designs. Now, after two years, she turns off skilled work and clears \$100 or more a month. Her husband's salary is \$75.

Doll-dressing, bean-bags made in cute animal shapes, baby rompers and creepers, and gingham and hand-embroidered sunbonnets for infants fill the spare moments of a clever New York woman most delightfully. Trade among a few intimate friends at first, but so well done as to be quickly advertised. Income per month always \$80 to \$40. Christmas season brought \$50 per month for mother, a bonus of \$25 to fourteen-year-old daughter assistant.

In each of us women lies the desire to do some one thing. If we stick to it patiently through the first slow moments, we will find the results astonishing for effort expended; and ourselves much happier because we are lifting our husbands' burdens, and giving something to life out of our real best selves!

5,000 BAY STATE ARMENIANS READY TO FIGHT FOR U.S.A.

Boston, May 12.—Gov. McCall has been informed in a letter from S. K. Boyajian, an American resident of this city, that there are at least 5,000 Armenians in Massachusetts of military age, who would be able and willing to form a complete regiment for war service. Many of these who are married fear that their wives, left in Turkey, when the men came to America have been murdered. The governor referred the letter to the acting adjutant general.
