Daily Hints for the Cook

Carrots and flaked fish may be used in place of cabbage.

WALNUT CAKE
One-half cup butter, 1 cup sugar, yolks of 3 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/4 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, whites of 2 eggs, 1/4 cup walnut meat. Cream butter, add sugar, then yolks well beaten. Mix slowly and flour sifted with baking powder. Carefully fold in whites beaten until stiff, then add nut meat. Bake 45 minutes in moderate oven. Cover with boiled frosting to which has been added 1/4 pound of marshmallows, melted over hot water with two tablespoons of boiling water. Press nut meat over the top. This cake never has a chance to grow stale.

BLACK FRUIT CAKE
One cup sugar 1/2 cup shortening, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 cup sour milk (sweet milk will do, but not quite so moist), 1 teaspoon soda, salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon clove, 1 cup raisins, 2 cups flour.
