Daily Hints for the Cook

HOW TO COOK SMOKED SHOULDER.
Soak the shoulder over night, rinse and put on in fresh cold water. When it comes to a boil turn off and fill kettle with fresh cold water, return to stove and boil until tender. Keep pouring in hot water as it boils away so that shoulder is nearly covered all the time. Do not cook it till it falls apart as it will not equal one lost. Shoulders cooked this way retain their flavor and are fine grained instead of being coarse-grained and tough. The economical present high price it is the most economical meat to buy.
CABBAGE PIE
Would some one like a recipe for cabbage as it is made in Kansas? When baked bread crumbs are used for the top. Roll out and line a dripping pan with it. If large enough so that it will fold over finely chopped fried cabbage, which you fill the pan with. Sprinkle half-boiled egg chopped on top of cabbage. Season with salt and pepper. Bake over dough and bake in oven until brown.

In the competitive examination for the lower grade of the inside service, W. M. Lundy, of St. John, was twenty-fifth, W. Mackin and W. W. Carvell passed.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Rev. Dr. Carman Arrives—Reports and Elections—Presentation to Historical Society
Sackville, N. B., June 17—Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Methodist church in Canada is here for the rest of the conference sessions.
At this afternoon's session Prof. Hunter, of the pulpits supply committee, reported as follows for Sunday next:
St. John (North), J. J. Pinkerton; Exmouth street, E. A. Westwoodland; Carleton Place, J. A. Ross; Queen square, H. Pierce; Fairville, O. Orman; Central, Moncton, H. D. Marr; Wesley Memorial, H. Harrison; Amherst, N. McLaughlin; Chatham, R. Opie; Dorchester, Wm. Harrison; Charlottetown, Geo. A. Ross; Main street Baptist, Sackville, J. C. Berrie; Freshwater, H. Penna; Middle Sackville Baptist, J. Edward Shanklin; Point de Bute, Geo. Steel; John's, H. E. Thomas.
A banquet under the auspices of the historical society was held in the dining room of the academy tonight, and was attended by 100 and proved to be a most enjoyable function. Rev. F. A. Wightman presided and addresses were delivered by Dr. Evans, of Hampton; Dr. Allison and Dr. Stewart, of Sackville. Brief remarks were also made by Dr. Carman.
Dr. Evans presented the society with some valuable old documents. S. D. Scott gave the society the first volume of the first edition of the Wesleyan, edited at that time by the late Dr. McLeod, one of the stalwarts of early Methodism. A resolution expressing the sincere regret of the society at the intended departure from the city of the late Dr. Carman, was moved by J. Hunter White, seconded by Dr. Inch, and carried unanimously.
The following officers were elected:
Honorary president, Dr. Wilson, St. John; president, Rev. F. A. Wightman, Moncton; P. E. E. Harrison, vice-president, Rev. A. D. McCully, Bathurst; second vice-president, Henry Smith, Charlottetown; third vice-president, C. A. Sampson, Fredericton; secretary-treasurer, Rev. Geo. A. Ross, Fairville; corresponding secretary, Geo. A. Henderson, St. John; caretaker of library, Prof. W. G. Watson, Sackville; executive committee, officers of the society with Rev. H. Harrison, Derby (N. B.); W. C. Turner, Charlottetown, and Rev. Geo. F. Dawson and J. J. Weddall, Fredericton.
The election of delegates to the general conference was continued this afternoon. On the third ballot, Rev. Dr. Rogers, Sussex; Rev. H. E. Thomas, Charlottetown; and Rev. M. R. Knight, Bayfield, were elected. At the fourth ballot, Rev. Wm. Harrison, Charlottetown, was elected, thus completing the list. Rev. N. McLaughlin, St. John (North) was elected reserve, and Rev. A. D. McCully, Bathurst, and Rev. George Ross, Fairville, alternates. The laymen elected were: C. C. Turner, Charlottetown; reserve, and Thomas Joyce and J. Hunter White, alternates. Rev. George Ross, Beledun, and J. N. Harvey, St. John, were elected to the board of missions.
Rev. George Ross, Fairville, read the report of the general conference fund. The districts raised the following amounts: St. John, \$11.85; Fredericton, \$74.00; Woodstock, \$6.70; Sackville, \$118.19; St. Stephen, \$41.72; Charlottetown, \$92.12; Summerside, \$87.45; total, \$697.19.
The following were recommended to the general conference for election as members of the board of report of Mount Allison College: Rev. Wm. Harrison, Charlottetown; Dr. Sprague, Sackville; Dr. Rogers, Summerside; M. Palmer, Dr. Inch, Sackville; R. C. Tait, Shediac.
Rev. James Crisp read the report of the children's fund committee which dealt with semi-independent circuits. It recommended that assessments be related from the following circuits: Zion, Apohaquin, Hampton, Gibson, Tabusintac, Derby, Bayfield, Sunny Brae, Albert, York, Murray Harbor and Grandville.
It was moved by Rev. Thomas Marshall, and seconded by Dr. Stewart, that the general conference be memorialized to amend discipline as to include all business now transacted in ministerial session in the work of the general conference.
Rev. Charles Flemington, Pettoicidae, reported for the sustentation fund, that it was found that this fund was now in a position to make grants to claimant circuits sufficient to lift the salaries of men on semi-independent circuits to a point far below the amount received by men on exclusive of \$95, for married men; \$65, for single men, and \$35 for professionals, inclusive of horse keep.

NEWS OF MONCTON

Moncton, June 17—The First Baptist church will be occupied Sunday next by Rev. Ernest A. Trites, of Manser, Maine, who was twelve or fifteen years ago a well known I. C. R. trainman. Since leaving the I. C. R. Mr. Trites has been living in Brookton (Maine), where he was employed for a number of years in a shoe factory. Deciding to enter the ministry he employed his spare time in study and took a theological course, recently graduating and being ordained. His first church was at Manser, Maine, where he is now located.
The condition of Lemont Black, who had his back broken in an accident on the G. T. P. Saturday last, continues critical, but he is reported tonight resting very well. His parents are still here with him.

THE CANADIAN CLUB

At a meeting of the executive of the Canadian Club yesterday afternoon, in the Times building, the secretary was instructed to extend congratulations to the Canadian Club of Moncton for inaugurating a movement for the more fitting observance of Dominion day as a national holiday, and to say that the St. John club cordially appreciated the importance of the movement. Rev. G. A. Kibbing and Dr. R. F. Quiley were appointed a committee to report on the subject, looking to appropriate action by the St. John club next year.
Jack Casey, R. J. Walsh and James B. Daly were elected members of the club and several other names were recommended.
There is no speaker in sight for July, but Henri Bourassa and the Bishop of London are expected to address the club later in the season.
Those present at the executive meeting were: M. E. Agar, H. A. Porter, Rev. G. A. Kibbing, Dr. R. J. T. H. Bullock, A. Henderson, R. T. Hayes, C. B. Allen and A. M. Bolding.

Jacob Brown President

The Building Trades Council held a meeting last night in the painters' hall, Charlotte street, and elected the following officers: Jacob Brown, of the Sheet Metal Workers' Union, president; James Metcalf, of the Masons' Union, vice-president; and James Suggs, of the Carpenters' Union, secretary-treasurer. The council now consists of four unions connected with the building trade, the painters, masons, carpenters and sheet metal workers. Plans were discussed as to the best means of inducing the other unions connected with the building trade to become affiliated with the council, and it is probable that an organizer will be brought here in the near future to work among the men.
The next meeting of the council will be in July at the call of the chair.

SPIDER-WEBS VELS ARE GRUESOME IN SUGGESTION
