SAINT JOHN POWER BOAT CLUB RACES WILL BE HELD TONIGHT

THE Saint John Power Boat Club have arranged for their annual speed boat races on Indiantown harbor this evening if weather conditions are favorable. HUGE SKELETON IS PARTLY UNCOVERED

Earthquake Reveals Gigantic Frame on Green Mountain Near Santa Barbara.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 30.—A gigantic petrified skeleton, which scientists have not yet decided was a mastodon or prehistoric toothed whale, has been discovered on Green Mountain, highest point on historic San Miguel Island, 60 miles from Santa Barbara's shore.

MAY CHANGE THEORY.

If the find proves to be a mastodon, it will disrupt the entire sequence of geology as worked out by scientists on the Pacific coast, according to D. B. Rogers, Smithsonian excavator. If it is a toothed whale, its discovery will be an equally valuable contribution to science and history.

"If it is a whale," Rogers said, "it died about the time the bottom of the sea rose, as it has been exposed to the air during the process of petrification, and is therefore imperfect and brittle. If it had petrified beneath the water, I believe it would have been as solid and hard as other specimens we have in the museum."

Capt. Bob Ord, veteran Santa Barbara navigator, made the discovery, and reported his find to scientific investigators. Except for the task of a sub-merged tiger found there 10 years ago, no mammal had ever been found on the quake-torn island before.

Ask Silencing of Train Whistles

AUGUSTA, Me., July 29.—A hearing before the public utility commission to be held at the Municipal Court room at Newport on July 31 on a petition filed by J. Willis Crosby and other legal voters of Dexter, declaring that the blowing of locomotive whistles on all southbound trains passing the whistle post west of the Bean or Centre street crossing of the Maine Central Railroad south of Zion's Hill Crossing "is and will continue to be an intolerable nuisance and annoyance and unwarranted interference with the peace of mind and rights of the residents of the property owners whose land and dwelling houses adjacent or are situated close to said Zion's Hill crossing."

The petitioners therefore pray the commission that the nuisance may be abated.

SAYS DEMPSEY HAS NOT SIGNED TO MEET GREB

LOS ANGELES, July 30.—Rob Roy Benton, who said he was speaking for Jack Dempsey, announced yesterday that the real estate holdings of the heavyweight boxing champion, and his manager had been divided and an agreement reached insuring Jack Kearns his split of the profits of any Dempsey bout prior to September 1926. The announcement followed conferences between Dempsey and Kearns.

Champion Will Not Meet Middleweight Title Holder

Whether there will be any Dempsey bout prior to September of next year, however, remains to be seen, Benton said, explaining that nothing has been done about the proposed bout at Michigan City, Ind., next September.

Has Not Signed
"Dempsey has not signed to fight Greb at Michigan City, and does not intend to," Benton said, the champion's spokesman. "No articles were sent to him to sign, nothing definite was done about the proposed Greb match, and as a result Dempsey has decided that if he fights any one at all in September, it will not be Greb."

War Veterans Grow Sugar Beets in Sand

VETERAN, Wyo., July 29.—War veterans homesteading government land in Goshute County, Wyoming, have set themselves the task of growing sugar beets in sand.

These settlers of Cherry Creek valley are faced with the job of transforming alkali-soaked soil into the productive land necessary for sugar beets. Approximately 300 of them have taken the struggle in this county alone.

The erstwhile soldier or sailor starts with a basic plan. He has no interest in pay on the debt, but the principal must be met.

Before he can do that, he must win out in his long struggle with weeds, brush, and replenish the soil with nitrogen and water the two elements it lacks for sugar beet growing.

He has an annual charge of about \$125 an acre to pay for his irrigation facilities, and statistics show it requires nine times as much labor to grow beets as it does corn and twelve times as much as it does to grow hay.

His job making himself a home usually requires about five years. Then he may expect profits.

A Good Coat of Tan Is Not Unhealthy

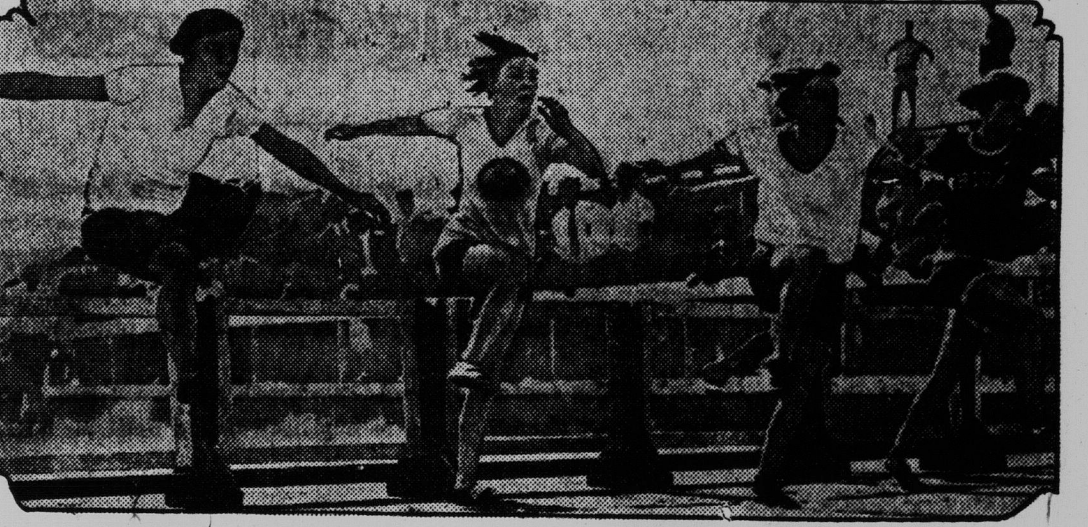
NEWARK, N. J., July 29.—Contrary to the belief of many persons, a good coat of vacation tan is not at all unhealthy and its collateral effects are certain to be beneficial, according to Dr. J. Allen Patton, medical of the Prudential Insurance Company.

Patton says that though the tan is not of itself particularly beneficial the sun bath which causes it has a stimulating and healing quality. The theory that tan closes the pores and obstructs perspiration is unfounded, he says.

Collie Saves Farmer Gored by Angry Bull

NEW YORK, July 30.—George J. Purdy, a farmer living near Croton, only to be gored by a 3,000-pound bull, which gored and trampled him as he led the animal to a water trough. Purdy's collie dog, hearing its master's cries, rushed at the bull and clawed and hit him until the heavy beast retreated. Farm hands hurried to the scene and roped the animal. Purdy suffered a badly dislocated shoulder and several fractured ribs.

Nine Events on the Card For Big Harness Meet at Aurora.

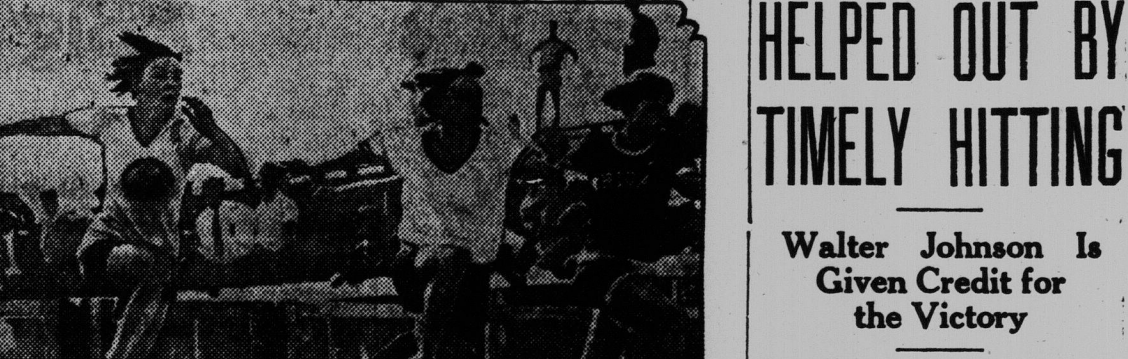
