### MONTROYAL TO BE GIVEN GOING OVER

Will Make One Voyage to Saint John and Then go on Cruise.

It is announced by the Canadian Pacific Steamships that the Montroyal is on her last trip to the St. Lawrence this season. On her return to England she is to be laid up for overhauling, preparatory to making winter cruises to the West Indies, with passengers, following her overhaul, and will sail from here for New York, the starting point for the cruises.

The Montroyal was scheduled to sail from Liverpool on October 23, but it has been arranged for the Montroyal to take this sailing, while the Montnair is to take the place of the Montrose, sailing from Liverpool on October 16 and from Quebec on October 30.

The Marburn, which arrived in Glasgow last Saturday, is now scheduled to take the October 9 sailing of the Montnair from that port.

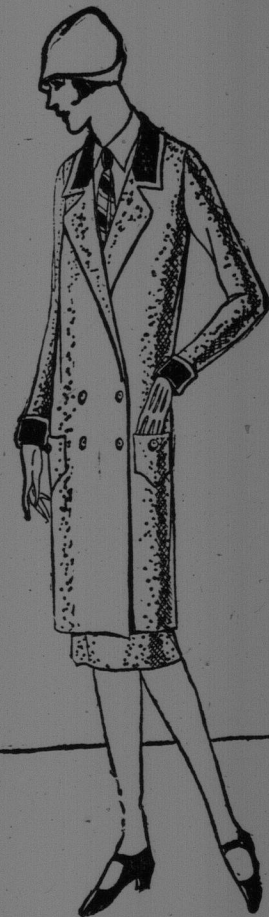

### HOPE TO PREDICT QUAKE VERY DEFINITELY SOON

Pioneers on the frontier of science expect that eventually it will be possible to predict the time and place of an earthquake.

Within a reasonable number of years they hope to be able to do that for the California earthquake region.

For the most comprehensive study of such a region ever undertaken is now under way in California.

The Carnegie Institution of Washington is carrying on the study with the aid of the U. S. Coast Survey, the U. S. Geological Survey, the Bureau of Standards, the University of California, Leland Stanford University and the U. S. Navy.

The first task, as Dr. Arthur L. Day of the Carnegie Institution points out, is to find out exactly what is happening inside the earth in the California region. For students of the earth now agree that an earthquake is merely the releasing of strains and stresses which have been accumulated through the shifting and movement of the layers of rock.

Many geologists believe that there is an actual movement or "creep" of the whole San Francisco bay region and that the land here, covered as it is with busy cities, villages and farms, is slowly moving northward at the rate of about one foot a year.

A survey has been undertaken of the San Francisco bay region in order to establish definitely any "creep" of the land.

A system of gigantic triangles is being marked out on the land starting with points at Mt. Loa and Mt. Round Top at the north and the Colorado river basin at the south.

By checking these measurements it will be possible to determine accurately every future shift of the land.

From work done so far, geologists believe that the land on the east side of the so-called San Andreas fault is creeping southward, while the land on the west side of it is moving northward.

The U. S. Geological Survey is co-operating in the study by making an intensive study of the structure of the rock layers in the region so that surface movements may be interpreted in the light of this knowledge.

With the aid of the new sonic depth-finder, the U. S. Navy has plotted the topography of the floor of San Francisco bay so that the scientists will have this additional knowledge to help them.

In addition, specially delicate seismographs have been set up in California so that a record of the slightest tremor will be had.

Little New Yorker Being Fed by Use of Medicine Dropper.

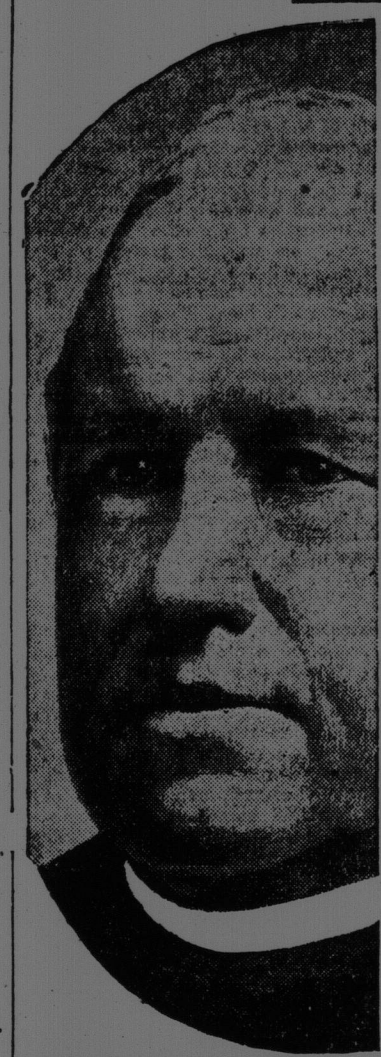
NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—A daughter, who weighed but two pound and 14 ounces, was born in Mary Immaculate Hospital at Jamaica last Wednesday to Mrs. Mildred Sabin of Jamaica. Since its birth the child has lost nine ounces, but apparently is in good health and normal in every way except size.

Members of the medical staff of the hospital say the baby is the smallest in their experience. Her mouth is too small to take nourishment from a spoon, and she is being fed a special milk preparation every three hours with a medicine dropper. She is swathed in blankets in a room kept at high temperature.
