ALLOW NO MORE OUT
ON HUNGER STRIKE

Dublin, Nov. 24.—Official notice was given yesterday that no more prisoners will be liberated, conditionally or unconditionally, for hunger striking, and that hunger strikers must themselves be responsible for the consequences of their acts. It was also announced that there would be no further amelioration of the prison treatment given any prisoner convicted under the defence of the realm act. This notice is regarded very seriously in Irish political circles.

LAVAL IN DAY OF TROUBLE

Montreal, Nov. 24.—Yesterday morning Dr. H. T. Birkett, C. B., C. M. G., as dean of the Medical Faculty of McGill University, called upon the acting dean of the medical faculty of Montreal (Laval) University, Dr. A. A. Foucher. Dr. Birkett expressed to Dr. Foucher the sympathy of McGill University to its sister institution in its great loss by fire, and offered to assist the medical faculty in any way possible, so that they might tide over the difficulties occasioned by the fire and carry on the work of the university as far as this was possible.

LONDON LENGTHENING AND PARIS CURTAILING SKIRTS

London, Eng., Nov. 24.—While we are making longer skirts and are having a big coat and skirt winter season, Paris is making very short ones, and sales there are good too," declares the leading West End ladies' tailor of this city. "The great demand seems to be for our ankle-length skirts and for coats that come down about four inches above the bottom of the skirt. The preference also is for skirts or the coat that are full about the hips, giving a hoop-like appearance. The actual skirt itself is as tight and narrow as ever. The women will not buy anything else. Why? Because that is the only reason they give, if that can be termed a reason."

ALLIES WILL CONTINUE TO ASSIST AUSTRIA

Paris, Nov. 24.—(Havas).—Decision to maintain after December 31 Allied co-operation in re-equipping Austria was reached yesterday by the supreme council. Italy's representative declared that country was ready to aid immediately after the conclusion of the financial agreement. Lord Crawford, British delegate, declared the only remedy for the fuel situation was intensified production throughout the world.

IRISH BANK CLERKS THREATEN TO STRIKE

Dublin, Nov. 24.—Bank clerks throughout Ireland will strike on December 31 unless the directors of banks consent to recognize their union, an action which they have hitherto refused to take. This was decided upon at a conference of the Irish bank clerks' union here yesterday. Fifty-six delegates voted unanimously in favor of the strike which will affect 8,000 of the 3,700 bank clerks in Ireland.

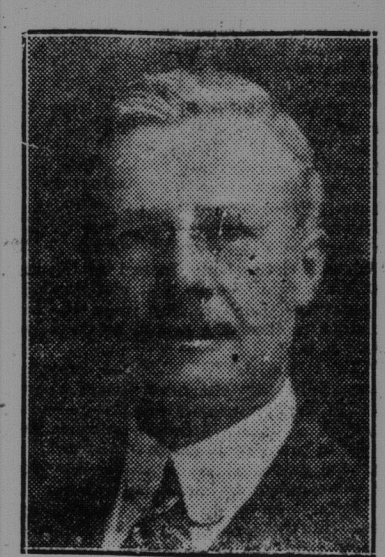

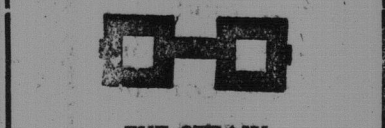

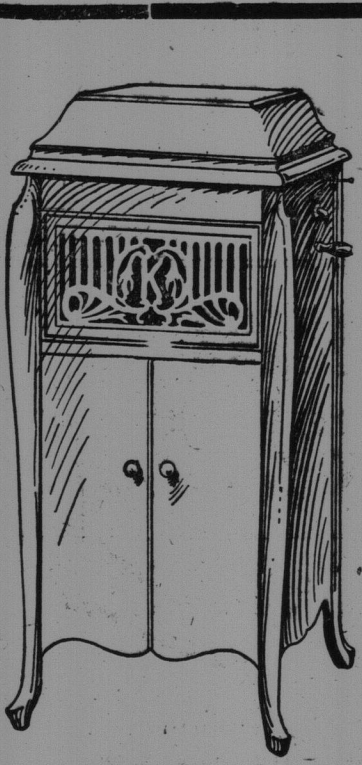

MARINE NOTES.

The S. S. Kamouraska, 2,673 tons, which arrived in port yesterday, brought 7,000 tons of bituminous coal for R. P. & W. F. Starr.

The steam schooner Dorchester, under charter to J. T. Knight & Co., to load coal at Sydney for Montreal, arrived at 8.30 o'clock this morning en route to this port.

It was recalled that she was reported on Nov. 4 as being badly and short of provisions when sighted by a passing steamer en route to New York.

After receiving provisions from the steamer she was able to proceed and reached Montreal.

The Canadian Steamship liner Bilbiler was reported passing Brier Island at 8.30 o'clock this morning en route to this port in ballast. She will be the first sailing of the company from St. John to Havre and is due to leave here Dec. 6.

The schooner Eva A. Dannenhauer is going on Gregory's blocks today to undergo a general overhauling, after which she will proceed to Apple River to load for New York. She is under charter to Nagle & Wigmore.

The tern schooner Whiteway arrived at Norfolk yesterday after a good passage from Londonderry, Ireland. She will load coal from there for a port in Portugal. Nagle & Wigmore are the local agents.

The four-masted schooner Holmes A. Frank, which recently put into Liverpool, N. S., with a damaged rudder, has had repairs made and this morning proceeded to New York. After discharging she will load coal for Genoa, Italy. Nagle & Wigmore are the local agents.

The Royal Mail Steam Packet liner Carbet, sent a wireless to Montreal agents this morning announcing that she would arrive at 4 o'clock this afternoon. She has 151 passengers, 3,000 tons of raw sugar and 1,000 tons of general cargo.

The steamer Kamouraska arrived in port yesterday morning with a cargo of coal from Sydney for R. P. & W. F. Starr.

The schooner Fundy King is ready to sail for Bluehill (Me.), to load a cargo of staves for this port.

Captain John H. Pratt, formerly in command of the Curlew at this port, and who has recently been in command of the Salvation Lass, has been transferred to a new 9,000-ton steamer, the Terra Haute, of the International Freightline Corporation. She is due to sail from Philadelphia to South America on her maiden trip on November 30.

RUSSIAN REPORTS

London, Nov. 24.—Continued advances against Gen. Denikin and Admiral Kolchak's forces are claimed in a Russian Soviet communiqué.

The Bolsheviks are asserted to be fast approaching Tsaritsyn, on the lower Volga. They report the capture of nearly 600 prisoners in the region of Tsaritsyn and 900 in the vicinity of Omsk. 800 prisoners were taken when Bistchensk was occupied.

Paris, Nov. 24.—(Havas).—One thousand copies of the newspaper L'Europe, which is published in Geneva and the circulation of which is forbidden in France because of its Bolshevik tendencies, were seized by the police yesterday, according to the Presse de Paris.

One of the articles printed in the newspaper stated there were signs that Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain was taking a more conciliatory attitude toward the Russian Soviet government. It said an inter-Allied conference would be held in London soon to study the Russian question, and expressed the opinion that peace between the Allies and Bolshevik Russia was not far distant.

COL. J. A. CURRIE TO
SOLDIERS ON POLITICS

Toronto, Nov. 24.—"The Conservative party at the present time is leaderless and is looking to the returned soldiers to furnish leaders," declared Col. J. A. Currie, M. P. for North Simcoe, in an address at the Peoples Forum here on Sunday. "The soldiers should ally themselves with one of the old parties," he added. "If that party is not the Conservative party then I am going to be in the soldiers' party."

Colonel Currie's address was along the lines of the future of the Conservative party, but soldier questioners interpreted the gratuity issue and warmly applauded the member for North Simcoe when he declared himself in favor of it.
