was a real community centre last even-
ing. At eight o'clock Chairman C. M.
Lingley looked benevolently down upon
an assembly of young and old folk that
almost filled the large hall, and as the
evening progressed they grew more and
more interested in the fine programme
and the work of the South End Improve-
ment League.

A group of boys from the Wiggins In-
stitution, with Mr. Pearce at the piano,
opened the proceedings with the chorus,
"The Great Red Dawn is Shining." This
was followed by a solo by Miss Nora
Powers, who was heartily cheered.

Commissioner Jones spoke briefly,
praising the work of the South End Im-
provement League. He said he felt there
should be an occasional band concert at
the new skating rink. He also fore-
cast the time when hosting in Courtenay
Park would be added to the baseball and other
summer activities at the playground. He
pledged himself to support the League in
its work, and was heartily applauded.

Master Willie Currie, whose violin
playing delighted the audience at a pre-
vious entertainment, played a solo, and
then another. The dialogue "Taking the
Census" was cleverly presented by Mar-
jorie Pearce, Tom Davis, Frank Phil-
lips, Ronald Davis and Walter Winter.
The Wiggins boys sang "The Red, White
and Blue," while a collection was taken
and then led by Betty Pearce, they gave
a remarkably fine exhibition of physical
exercises. The cleverness and fine train-
ing of these bright faced lads was a sub-
ject of general praise, and they received
much hearty applause.

Chairman Lingley spoke briefly on the
work of the League and its plans, point-
ing out that it hoped to enlarge the play-
ground next year and provide for the
girls as well as the boys. He hoped also
to see something done for the fast skaters

monthly meetings he suggested that
the League should have a skating rink.
G. N. Hatfield explained what had
been done in regard to the skating rink.
It was necessary to protect the children,
but the committee would try to provide
a special time for the fast skaters. They
had some fast ones, and he would like
to see them pitted against others in the
city and if they had the speed to win
the League would send them to
Montreal or elsewhere to represent St.
John. (Applause.) Mr. Hatfield then
pleaded for general sympathy for the League
in its work.

A. M. Belding said this meeting would
fall in its purpose if it did not increase
the interest of south end folk in south
end improvement. There was much to be
done. No child in the south end could be
neglected or injured but the community
must be taught to protect the children.
The like was true of the housing of
the people. If reforms were to come
in St. John the people must get
together and work for it. All this
south end movement thus far had result-
ed from a telephone call one morning by
Rev. H. A. Cody in behalf of south end
boys. That led to the first meeting in
this room and the getting together of
the people for a community purpose.

Mr. Belding appealed to the men and
women present to catch the spirit and
see to it that the next monthly meeting
and entertainment was even more repre-
sentative of the south end of the city.

Rev. Mr. Cody, who was present, paid
a warm tribute to the men who had
worked so hard last summer to make a
playground. They worked under great
difficulties. As for the fast skaters, he
was sure provision could be made for
them. He rejoiced in the awakening
community spirit. The matters of hous-
ing and child-welfare must be taken up
by the people. The League had his
hearty sympathy and support.

Thomas Kilien discussed rink matters
and expressed the League's thanks to
those who assisted in the entertainment.
J. N. Elmore, vice-chairman of the
League, put it up squarely to the peo-
ple to make the League a power for
good. The matters referred to by pre-
vious speakers should bring them together
for the common good. It was good to be
present at this meeting, and to see the
evidence of splendid training in the work
of the boys in Mr. Pearce's charge. If
the people would come together they
could do what in a few years would
make them proud to say they were mem-
bers of this league. What had been said
about the need of caring for the boys
and girls should appeal to all.

Alex. Wilson, the treasurer, reported
receipts \$225, and a good bal-
ance on hand. It was decided to pur-
chase a proper house for the skating rink,
and Mr. Hatfield announced that the
carpenter, William Richards, would con-
tribute ten dollars toward it. Mr. Hat-
field foreshadowed a better rink for next

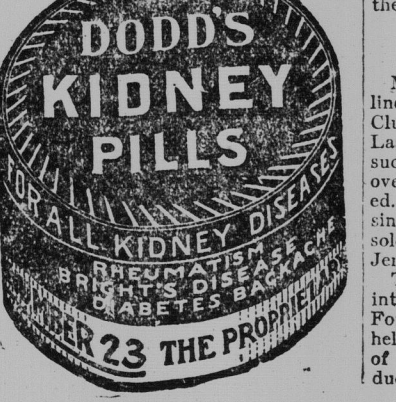
