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Wants Tariff Cut Swift and Deeply Germans Take

Winnipeg, March 5—Yesterday afternoon the Manitoba legislature unanimously adopted a resolution moved by A. W. Miles, member for Cypress, in favor of an immediate and substantial reduction of the customs tariffs, the reduction of the customs duty on goods imported from Great Britain to one half, the acceptance of the reciprocity agreement with the United States as proposed in 1911, the placing on the free list of foodstuffs and agricultural implements, and the extension to Great Britain of all tariff concessions. This was after a strong expression of opinion from Premier Norris that never in the history of Canada was the time so opportune as now for a revision of the tariff on the lines of substantial reduction.
