SEVEN BUILDINGS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Disastrous Fire at Hawkesbury, C. B.—An Investigation Will Be Held.

Sydney, May 26.—Seven buildings were destroyed in Port Hawkesbury this morning through a fire which commenced at 11.30 o'clock in the roof of the house of Mrs. Norman McIntyre. Fanned by a strong north wind, the flames spread and were not extinguished until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. It is stated that an investigation will be held. The buildings destroyed were Mrs. Norman McIntyre's house and store, the Western Union Telegraph building, the homes of A. C. Chisholm, John D. McPherson and Andrew Strong, and the customs house. Fire in the Presbyterian church and the home of Mr. S. Chisholm was extinguished with little difficulty.

GIRLS VICTIMS OF POMP.

Amsterdam, May 11.—(Associated Press)—Bavarian high school girls, forced by an official order issued "at his majesty's personal request," have paid tribute to German court pomp, according to the Munich Post.

The occasion was the royal golden wedding celebration, and the school girls were made to assemble, attired in thin white dresses and dilapidated shoes, despite bitter cold and an icy pavement, in front of the royal palace and sing patriotic songs for an hour.

"Two of the girls," the Munich paper relates, "half-starved as they were, have succumbed to consumption. Four others were taken seriously ill, and one is undergoing treatment in the municipal hospital."

War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

SUCCESSFUL CROPS.

Many amateur gardeners are puzzled to know just how to handle a succession of crops. To get the most out of a small area it is necessary to plant seeds from week to week and, in some cases, to sow two crops in one row at one time. For instance, lettuce and radish may be sown in the same row, perennials and lettuce, corn and pumpkins, corn and spinach, lettuce and early cabbage, etc.

Some examples of successful plantings may serve to explain what is meant by following one crop with another:

Early beets followed with celery.

Early beans followed with turnips.

Lettuce or onion sets followed with tomatoes.

Radishes followed with tomatoes.

Spinach, lettuce or radishes followed with cabbage.

Early crops may be taken off and consumed and immediately afterwards their place may be taken by some other crop. The soil should be dug over and more manure added if possible. This should be followed by a careful raking down before the plants are set out or the seeds planted.

MOTHERS' ALLOWANCE

Manitoba Government's Act: Report of Commissioners

Period April 18, 1916 to June 30 1917—History of Movement in Manitoba Before Passing of Mothers' Allowances Act

In 1910 the Mothers' Association gave a cash allowance to one woman, with whom they had become acquainted through their day nursery, enabling her to stay at home and look after the children. This continued for one year when she remarried.

In March, 1913, G. B. Clarke, at the time district agent of the Associated Charities of the city of Winnipeg, asked for all relief, etc., be given in cash instead of in kind to a widow and children in his district.

The secretary of the Associated Charities obtained permission from the board of trustees to make a special appeal to citizens for a monthly cash pension for this widow. In April, 1914, at the suggestion of the Associated Charities, the Mothers' Association appointed a special committee under the chairmanship of the late Mrs. J. B. Clarke, to raise the necessary money by voluntary subscription.

During the summer and fall of 1915, it being understood that the Mothers' Association committee would ask for legislation at the next session of the provincial legislature, the Social Workers' Club of Winnipeg through a committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. B. Clarke, made an exhaustive study of "mothers' pension laws and their administration" in twenty-three of the United States, and called "State Salaries for Mothers," and a copy sent to all members of the legislature.

In November, 1915, the convention of Manitoba municipalities at Stonewall endorsed the principle of mothers' allowances.

On March 10, 1916, an act entitled "The Mothers' Allowances Act," introduced as a government measure, was assented to.

Appointment of Commissioners.

By order-in-council No. 25961, dated April 18, 1916, Messieurs E. D. Martin, Geo. Fisher, J. H. T. Falk and Messieurs John Dick and T. R. Deacon were appointed commissioners to administer the act.

The commissioners realize that no one of them has had official experience previously in connection with the administration of mothers' allowances, but they conscientiously utilized all the information available from other sources and adapted it to local conditions and believe that the individual experience of each one in other capacities has enabled them to perform their duties reasonably well.
