

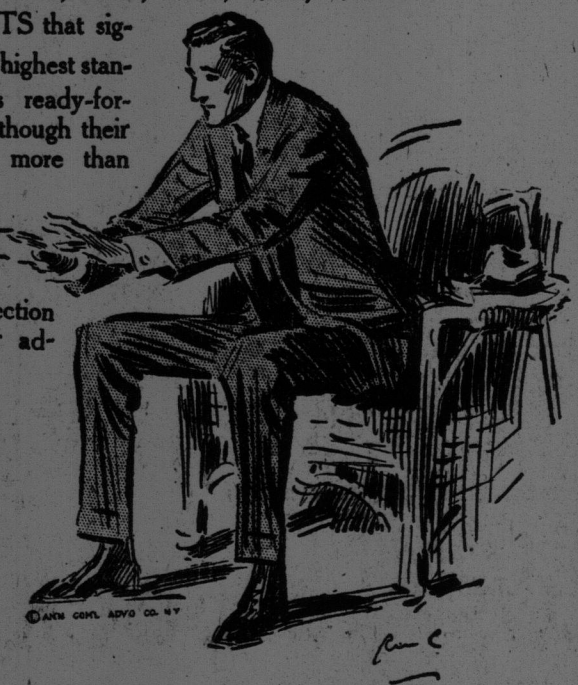

## SURVIVORS TELL TERRIBLE TALE

Eleven Now Death Toll in Barry's Bay Disaster

## SINKING OF STEAMER

Vessel Plunged Down, Throwing All Into Icy Water—Three Drift Ashore Only to Experience Fearful Suffering Till Help Comes

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 14.—A despatch from Barry's Bay this morning, states that it is now believed eleven persons perished in the Mayflower disaster. Only the bodies of Captain Harcourt and Patrick O'Brien, a passenger, have been recovered, but two search parties are out. The three survivors, Harper, Pevely and Inlack of Ottawa, have been taken to Combermere, but are in such a terrible condition from exposure that little can be learned from them, save that the vessel went down in ten minutes.

The dead body of Captain E. Partehier, of Combermere, skipper of the ill-fated boat, was picked up near the shore where the steamer is supposed to have sunk. His body had a life preserver on.

The body of Patrick O'Brien of Combermere, a passenger, was also found on the island, where he died, exhausted and exposure to the cold, after being thrown ashore by the surging waters.

From the brief story of the three survivors, it seems the Mayflower sprang aloft soon after she left Barry's Bay. Her hold rapidly filled with water, and those on board quickly realized that death was imminent. There was hardly a moment to decide on how their lives could be saved.

A howling wind was sweeping down over the river, which is nearly a mile wide at the point where the boat sprang a leak, and the water was lashing the sides of the ill-fated vessel with a vengeance. All around was black.

The boat began to lurch a little more and then, terribly, then the old seal oil lamps went out by being crushed to the floor and all was darkness. The boat heeled over broadside and sank, suddenly throwing passengers, crew, freight and all into the icy waters.

The wooden structure threw back the echoes of the cries of the drowning ones. The three survivors were able to discern some spans of timber floating about where they had been hurled into the water. They clung to these, and half perished in water that was cold with ice, they drifted ashore, but more dead than alive.

Throughout the long, cold night, and even colder day, in a blinding snow storm, they waited and prayed that help would come. Death stared at them from the last, when hope seemed practically gone, they heard the swirl of oars and the sound of voices, and from that moment forward they remembered nothing more until they awoke in a home with kind faces around them and kind hands to attend to their wants.

Twice under the gallows; HE IS AGAIN REPRIVED

Montreal Murderer Now Gets Unit January 17—Alleged to Examine Him

Montreal, Nov. 14.—For the third time in the last six months Mr. Justice Gervais in the Court of King's Bench sentenced Sylvio Yacovlev to hang for the murder of his sister-in-law, Marie Louise Tremblay, the date being now extended from Friday next until Friday, January 17.

Yacovlev, who was brought up from the jail to be present while Mr. Justice Gervais gave his decision to J. O. Fournier and Arthur Geoffroy, who had made a motion before him for a reprieve for the condemned man, displayed the same sullen indifferent attitude as he did during his trial, and listened unmoved when Mr. Justice Gervais pronounced the death sentence.

"It is considered and prayed and ordered by this court that you, Sylvio Yacovlev, be taken hence to the prison of this district where you came, and on Friday, the 17th of January next, within the walls of the prison in which you shall then be confined, you shall be hanged by the neck until you be dead."

Yacovlev at the June term of the Court of King's Bench was sentenced to hang on September 20, and a reprieve was obtained and the prisoner sentenced again to hang on Friday next, and yesterday for the third time he was condemned to hang on January 17.

The condemned man's counsel, however, are working for commutation of Yacovlev's sentence to life imprisonment, and Mr. Justice Gervais before granting a reprieve was given a report from Dr. E. P. Benoit, of the Montreal jail, to the effect that Yacovlev by his general behavior did not seem to be in full possession of his mental faculties. This report concluded with a recommendation that he should be submitted for observation and examination by alienists. This report will go to the minister of justice and it is thought probable that a medical commission will be appointed to examine the prisoner.

## MORE FOX FARMS

Notice is given of the application for a charter for "Silver Foxes, Ltd.," to carry on all or any of the business of raising, breeding, importing, exporting, and improving foxes, mink, muskrat, and beaver animals of every sort and description, and of furries in all its branches.

The capital stock of the company is to be \$250,000, or twenty-five hundred shares of \$100 each. The applicants are Messrs. Harvey Lee Hewson, Amherst, Nova Scotia, capitalists; Norman C. Christie, of Amherst, manufacturer; Neil McQuarrie, Summerside, barrister-at-law; Mrs. Melina Hewson and Mrs. Eliza C. Hewson of Amherst.

The North Sydney Herald states that another fox farm is about to be started at Wycombe, to exceed in size the one recently started there by Dr. Donald T. McPhail of New York. This one will be owned jointly by Dr. Donald T. McPhail's brothers, J. A. McPhail, general contractor and builder of Calgary, Alberta, and Dr. Garfield McPhail of New York.

The farm has started under the most favorable auspices, two prize black foxes having last week been purchased from a P. E. I. dealer, for a sum said to be in the vicinity of \$14,000.

The Sydney Post is informed that a company is being organized in the city for the purpose of carrying on a fox farming industry in Cape Breton, the site of which will probably be up the Sydney river. It is proposed to purchase a pair of black foxes, to cost approximately \$60,000. This amount is being aimed at as capital, but if it is found that the six pairs of foxes are to cost more, the amount required will be raised. A reliable man from P. E. I., who knows the business perfectly, is being brought here to manage the business and look after the stock.

## PETER LYALL DEAD

Montreal, Nov. 14.—Peter Lyall, one of Canada's biggest contractors, died suddenly this morning. He had erected many of the biggest private and public buildings in the country.

Mr. Lyall was one of the most outstanding figures in the civic life of Montreal and died much to bring about the establishment of the board of control at the city hall. He was a member of the board of trade, a director of the Citizens' Association, president of the Western Hospital and the Protestant Hospital for the Insane at Verdun. He had been president of the Montreal Caledonian Society and of the Reform Club.

To Control Vancouver Harbor.  
Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 14.—An act known as "Vancouver Harbor Commissioners Act," drafted by H. H. Stevens, M. P., to be presented at the next session of parliament, provides for the appointment of commissioners to constitute the "Vancouver Harbor Board," of three commissioners, one of whom shall be appointed by the city council and the other two by the government. This board will have complete control of the harbor.
