Strenuous efforts are being made to force a vote before adjournment today. Chairman Underwood of the committee on ways and means, is conferring all possible pressure to shape action.

The Post declares that it does not matter that these vessels are called training ships; their presence at the head of the Great Lakes is a violation of the Rusk-Bagot treaty and a standing menace to Canadian independence.
