It is very gratifying to us, to know that the peculiar principles of our Church Organization are rapidly gaining ground on this Continent; and while we regret that the way does not seem clearly to open to a union between those Methodist Churches who are in this respect one in sentiment, we sincerely hope the time is not far distant, when the great family of Methodism will adopt a system of Church Government so scriptural and rational as our own.
