STREET RAILWAY EMPLOYES
GET INCREASES.
Coming out of the strike last year
with their forces sadly demoralized
the Ottawa division of the Amaigamated Street and Electric Railway Employes of America immediately undertook a re-organization
under new leadership. Frank McRae was made the commander-inchief of the local forces and some
weeks ago the division was so well
organized that a new agreement
was submitted to the Ottawa Street
Railway Company. Negotiations
proceeded for some little time but
in the end the men were forced to
apply for a Board of Conciliation
to the Labor Department. This was
established and A. E. Fripp, K.C.
M.P., was the men's representative,
while Geo. Kelley, K.C.. was named
by the company. Judge McLellan, of Montreal, was appointed
chairman. Sittings of the board
were held last week and on Ftiday a unanimous award was made.
The salient features of the agree-

were held last week and on Friday 2 unanimous award was made. The salient features of the agreement provide for the following:

1. Men are to get a general infrease of 10 cents an hour. First year men will get 49 cents, second year 51, third year 53, and fourth year, 55 cents.

2. Company agrees to recognize the union and agree that the standing of any employe shall not be affected by membership in the association.

3. The agreement provides that nine hours shall constitute a day's work, with time and a haif for all work in excess. All runs shall be completed, within four and a half consecutive hours. 5. Spare men who were getting \$75 a month will be paid at the rate of \$42.50 every two weeks. This is a guaranteed minimum provided they report.

OTTAWA NEWSY BRIEFS.
Sixteen new members were added to the membership of the local Steam and Operating Engineers' Union at their last regular meeting. Twelve more applications have been received since the last meeting, according to Business Agent Charles Lewis, of the local union.

According to Business Agent M. Beaudet, of the local Union of Hotel and Restaurant Employes, an increase of \$5 per month has been offered to all cooks and waiters in the local establishments. The union demanded an increase of \$10 per month and at a meeting of the local contents.

J. A. P. Haydon, editor of the Canadian Labor Press, has been sent to Montreal by the United Leather Workers of America, to endeavor to adjust a dispute between the leather workers of Montreal and their employers.

During the past week more retirements from the Government Printing Bureau, at Ottawa, have been made. Included in the forty-three are three returned soldiers. It is probable that their case will be taken to the commission, and an investigation demanded.

On Tuesday the new agreement between the Ottawa Branch of the Association of Building and Construction Industries of Canada and the Ottawa Building Trades' Council was signed by the employers organization and the workers. The agreement, besides provides for double time for all work performed on Saturday afternoons and work between the hours of six and ten o'dlock in the evening.

An Open Letter re Fuel Situation

To Readers of The Canadian Labor Press:
