Prof. John Craig, of the Experimental Ferm at Ottawa, was in the city Saturday. He has just returned from P. E. Island, where he has been delivering a series of lectures with a view of developing the fruit industry on the Island.

The meetings were largely attended and much interest was manifested by those present. It is probable that as a result of these meetings a Provincial Fruit Growers' association will be formed.

Mr. Craig gives a glowing account of the condition of the dairying on the Island. The uneamery under dominion government patronage at Charlottstown, and managed by Supt. Dilbon, is the largest in Canada, turning out daily in the neighborhood of 2,000 lbs. of butter.

Professor Craig has been receiving as well as conveying instruction on this tour. He made two trips in the ice boats between Tormentine and Traverse. The first journey was on the eastward trip, when the load of mail was heavy and the thermometer several points below zero. The professor was the only passenger taken, if one may be called a passenger who walks all the way and puts in six hours of hard pulling.

Professor Craig speaks highly of the enterprise and progressive spirit of the Prince Edward Island farmers. They got a favorable idea of the Experimental Farm staff from their experience in butter and cheese, and he was fortunate enough to get the benefit of this apprediction to the extent that they came in great numbers, heard what he had to say, and piled him with practical questions. He was sorry not to be able to attend the Farmers' and Dalrymens' meeting at Fredericton.
