THE PIQUANT DENISON.
(Monetary Times.)
Colonel Denison, whose remarks are usually pertinent and piquant, his criticism of bank managers is rather strong. "It is getting to be a very common practice for bank managers to discount forged notes," he said in the Toronto police court. "Yes, they are considered very valuable security," replied the crown attorney. "If some of these bank managers get into jail, it will serve them right," concluded his worship. These remarks were made during the hearing of a case concerning a Cobourg merchant, against whom the crown has been ordered to lay a charge of forgery. The prisoner is alleged to have forged a name for four hundred dollars. The banker who discounted the forged note will be required to give his explanation of the matter. Perhaps it is too early to make any comment concerning either Colonel Denison's caustic criticism or the subject of forgery. Both are interesting.
