BRIEF DESPATCHES

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 20.—Solomon Cohen, a well known cigar manufacturer, shot and killed himself in a north end hotel today. He left a statement that he was tired of living. Cohen was 45 years old.

AMHERST, Mass., Aug. 20.—President Konyon L. Butterfield made known tonight his plans for the celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the opening of the Massachusetts Agricultural College. A conference on "rural progress" will be held from October 2 to 5 inclusive.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 20.—Four persons were drowned here this afternoon when a duck boat capsized in the Sacramento River.

BEVERLY, Mass., Aug. 20.—Two incendiary fires here tonight destroyed

the barns of Patrick McSweeney and B. C. Smith, contractor. McSweeney's barn, four horses, were burned to death and in Smith's eleven horses were burned. The total loss is about \$35,000. The buildings contained a large amount of hay and feed and building implements.

VIOLINIST LOST IN THE ALPS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Francis Bea MacMillen, the American violinist, whose genius has attracted attention both in this country and abroad, is reported in cable advices to be lost in the Alps.

A brother, Samuel E. MacMillen of this city, today received a cablegram from MacMillen, stating that Francis was lost three days ago while attempting the ascent of Mont Blanc.

BIG GAME IN AFRICA NOW REACHED BY RAILWAY TRAINS; HUNTING IN DARK CONTINENT

A visit to South and Central Africa will show why great game has been thinned out so alarmingly that the elephant and giraffe are now rarely seen south of the Zambesi. It is mainly due to a dozen murders of railway enterprise that are being pushed in order that Cecil Rhodes' dream of 8,000 miles of track between Cape Town and Cairo should be realized.

One may now enter a train of palace cars at Cape Town and travel 2,000 miles straight to the great Zambesi river that divides the Dark Continent in two. Not even the mighty falls stay the transcontinental road. It is carried across the gorge 400 feet deep by a steel bridge, and a little beyond the traveller is amazed to find the magnificent forested Grand Hotel, with a hundred bedrooms, electric lights and elevators and fans, dumped down amid a savage scenery. From the windows of this strange hotel one may shoot rhinoceros and giraffe, lion and leopard and hippo, not to mention twenty kinds of antelope, from the immense kudu down to the little harebeest and impala.

It is the famous and costly "Big Game Limited" that whisks one into the savage heart of Africa. Little more than fifteen years ago the 700,000 square miles of Rhodesia had not a mile of railway. Then came that fatal cattle plague known as the rinderpest, which decimated the country of even the most primitive means of transport, and on top of this the Matabele rebellion of 1896, which resulted in terrible slaughter of the whites.

These two causes led to great activity of railway building in the vast territory to which Cecil Rhodes gave his name, and the last 228 miles, from Palapye to Bulawayo, were laid in the incredibly short space of four and a half months. Then it was that the old coaching days in this part of Africa passed away forever.

It is not until Bulawayo is reached that even the larger antelopes are seen from the car windows. Within a few miles of this boom town of the veldt are the wild, rocky Matopos Hills, where, eleven years ago, Cecil Rhodes went unarmed and almost alone to talk over the Matabele savages to peace. Here, too, imbedded in the solid granite lies Cecil Rhodes' body, the tomb facing a grand panorama of Central Africa, can scenery which the empire builder himself called "the view of the world."

GREAT PIECE OF WORK.

It was in 1898 that Rhodes formulated a scheme for the extension of the main trunk line from Bulawayo by way of Gwelo to the Zambesi and thence onward to Lake Tanganyika. His restless ambition hoped that mean while the British Government would be pushing south through the swamps and forests of the upper Nile and thus gradually a Cape to Cairo Railway, all British, would become an accomplished fact.

Just beyond Norton the Big Game Limited runs through an oddity of forest of mahogany, teak and poplar wood. The trunks were twisted into strange fantastic shapes years ago through having been torn and trampled upon as sentinels by the vast herds of elephant that roamed over all this district.

After a stay at the strangest of Grand Hotels in the very heart of Central Africa the traveller may push on yet farther north to Broken Hill, either 400 or 500 miles. In places he will see the lords of the jungle gazing

innocently at the express as it thunders by. Vast herds of zebra are seen grazing like cattle in a field at home; and here and there one notices the telegraph wires torn down, most likely by mischievous elephants or terrified giraffes flying from the natural enemy, the lion.

There is really very little of a gap left to complete the Cape to Cairo stretch of 8,000 miles, and on the railway today the wealthy traveller will find himself in a wilderness more wild and dense than any that even Stanley or Livingstone faced a quarter of a century ago.

SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. FATHER DOLLARD

Eloquent Preacher Passed Away in
South Brewer, Me.

Once a Professor at Memramcook and
Was Well Known Here—Drained
23 Years Ago

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Aug. 20.—This community heard with sad surprise this afternoon of the death of Rev. William Dollard at South Brewer, Maine, where he was connected with the Roman Catholic parish. Father Dollard was the priest in charge of the parish here after its separation from Milltown about twenty years ago, remaining here until about six years ago. Afterwards he was employed as professor at Memramcook and was afterwards in charge of the parish at Johnville, Charlton County, but had been connected with the Maine diocese for the past two years. He was a young man of brilliant attainments, genial in his personality and popular with all classes. No particulars of his death have been received.

The sad news of Rev. Father Dollard's death was received by His Lordship Bishop Casey yesterday afternoon. The death occurred yesterday morning at the rectory in South Brewer.

Rev. Mr. Dollard was ordained in the Cathedral here about 23 years ago and after serving three years in the Cathedral was placed in charge of the newly created parish of St. Stephen, he being the first pastor. He served there honorably and usefully for 14 years during which time he built the beautiful little church of the Holy Rosary and the parochial residence there. From St. Stephen Father Dollard was called to St. Joseph's College, as professor of English. Later he went to Johnville, for the past two years he has been employed in clerical work in the diocese of Portland.

Father Dollard was an eloquent speaker and a writer of considerable note, both in the press and in magazines. He was a grand-nephew of the Right Rev. William Dollard, the first Catholic Bishop of New Brunswick, and a nephew of Rev. James Quinn, well known in the history of this diocese. His death will bring profound sorrow to many friends.

DECEASED WIFE'S SISTER BILL

LONDON, Aug. 21.—After a prolonged and animated debate the House of Lords last night passed the second reading of the deceased wife's sister bill by 111 votes to 73. The majority included every one of the seventeen bishops who are members of the House.
