SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. JOHN HUGHES

Veteran Baptist Minister Stricken With Heart Failure Saturday Morning—The Funeral Arrangements.

The death of Rev. John H. Hughes, the second oldest minister of the Baptist denomination in this province, occurred very suddenly on Saturday morning at his home, No. 2 Canard street, North End. He had not been in good health lately, but nothing serious was apprehended. Shortly after nine o'clock he was found in the bathroom by Mrs. Hughes, apparently stricken with heart failure. Dr. McIntyre was immediately summoned, but Mr. Hughes was beyond earthly aid, and passed away a few minutes later.

His death was naturally a great shock to his wife and friends. He was to have preached yesterday at McDonald's Corner, having preached at Hampstead the previous Sunday. Mr. Hughes had not had any regular pastoral charge of recent years, but had been supplying different pulpits during the absence of the regular pastors. Rev. John H. Hughes was born in this city on the 12th of March, 1829. After a course of study in the Baptist Seminary at Fredericton he was ordained to the ministry and became pastor of the Baptist church at Hillsboro in 1854. After a successful pastorate of ten years there he went to Havelock, N. B., and East Boston, Mass. He was a notable figure in Baptist circles as a preacher and learned theologian. His mental powers remained unimpaired up to the time of his death.

Mr. Hughes is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Turner, a niece of ex-Gov. McLean, two daughters, Mrs. W. Hawley Merritt of Hillsboro, Col., and Miss Elizabeth Hughes, a teacher in the High School, New Haven, Conn.; and one son, Welcome Hughes of Worcester, Mass. At 8:30 a. m. on Tuesday there will be a service at the home, conducted by the Rev. David Hutchinson, pastor of the Main street Baptist church, of which the deceased was a member. Other clergymen of the city will also assist at this service, and the remains will afterwards be conveyed to Havelock, N. B., where interment will take place on Wednesday. There will be a public funeral service on Wednesday in the Baptist church at Havelock, at which the Rev. W. B. McIntyre, D. D., will preach a funeral sermon.



RECENT DEATHS.

MICHAEL HACKETT. CHATHAM, Sept. 15.—Michael Hackett, a former resident of Chatham, but for several years a citizen of Medix River, Pennsylvania, where he conducted a large hotel business, died very suddenly about a quarter to six in the Bowler House on Thursday evening. Mr. Hackett had been suffering from heart trouble for some time and about a month ago came to Chatham to get treatment from Dr. Murray. In addition to the more serious malady Mr. Hackett suffered from asthma and had slept a little for some nights. Thursday was a warm day but rather sultry, and the oppressiveness of the atmosphere affected Mr. Hackett keenly. He complained of not feeling well, but was sitting on the sofa in the office of the hotel chatting with acquaintances and enjoying a cigar. Just as he threw this latter away he fell sideways and lapsed in almost complete unconsciousness. Mr. Flanagan, who was near, hurriedly dipped a cloth in cold water and bathed his forehead. For an instant he seemed to recover possession of his faculties, but in three minutes or less time he was dead.
