

CONDENSED

Surveyors Killed by Land Slide in West - Labor Trouble in Ireland Becoming Critical.

Surveyors Killed. Ketchikan, Alaska, Sept. 13.—Two surveyors attached to the Canadian boundary survey were killed last Saturday, when a land slide destroyed their camp at Cape Mussen, Dall island, according to word received here today. The names of the men were given as Rebertson and Bude.

Labor Crisis Acute. Dublin, Sept. 13.—The labor crisis became suddenly acute today on account of the decision of the farmers throughout Dublin county to lock out all the laborers who are members of the Transport Workers' Union. They have given the men a week's notice, but it is expected that the farm hands will not wait to be locked out but will go on strike at once.

Cholera Spreading. London, Sept. 13.—Cholera, which was rampant in the near east after the Balkan war, is now extending westward. Residents at an visitors to the fashionable watering place Martenbad have been thrown into a state of consternation by the discovery of a case at that place.

Treasurer Missing. Saskatoon, Sask., Sept. 13.—John S. Johnston, who has acted as cashier to the Saskatchewan Board of Trade for the past year and a half, has disappeared and it is alleged that a considerable sum of the board's finances has disappeared with him. The facts have just come to light, after Johnston has been absent for over a month, leaving his wife and four children to starve.

Bars Thaw Pictures. Boston, Sept. 13.—Mayor Fitzgerald says he will not permit any of the moving picture houses of Boston to use any of the Thaw pictures taken in connection with his escape, capture and flight through Canada and New Hampshire.

Rumor Denied. Rome, Sept. 13.—It is semi-officially announced that there is no foundation for the rumors in circulation that popular meetings are being organized which will visit and plunder the island of Rhodes in the Mediterranean.

Chinese Mystery. Montreal, Sept. 13.—A web of murder, theft and Chinese intrigue that would make one of NICK CARTER's detective stories blush is at the bottom of the visit paid to Montreal by "Big Pete" O'Donnell and Jimmy Wilkinson, crack United States secret service men. With them came Charlie Foo, employed by the United States government to ferret out crimes committed by his countrymen.

Yet Ken To, a wealthy Chinese resident of Chicago, was murdered recently on his doorstep. Curious little yellow notes, his wife told the police, had been coming for several weeks before his death. They made To very nervous, the little woman declared, and then finally came the shot, the scream and To was dead. He would not pay tribute to the Tong, his wife said.

BLACK FOX VALUES BIG

Returns Show Ranches are Easily Worth Over \$10,000,000—Many Animals in Captivity.

Charlottetown, Sept. 13.—A return prepared by J. E. B. McCready, publicity agent, shows that the total capitalizations of the fox companies incorporated by special acts in the legislature and by letters patent amounts to \$8,405,000.

The other companies, the Silver Fox Ranching Co. of Alberton, and the Tuppia Co. are not in the above list, one being incorporated in Massachusetts and the other in Nova Scotia. Their added capital would be \$600,000, making a total capitalization of the companies chartered down to August 12 to \$9,000,000. Besides these companies there are over 120 ranches not owned by chartered companies.

Statistics in process of compilation by the provincial government and not yet made public show the following results: Total number of fox ranches in P. E. I. 233 Total number of foxes in captivity 2,480 Old silver blacks 642 Young silver blacks 638

Total Old patches 1,325 Old silver blacks 220 Young patches 223 Total Old reds 443 Young reds 244 Total Old cross 581 Young cross 14 Total Old unclassed 32 Old unclassed 89

The sworn valuation of the young foxes this year is \$3,575. An estimated valuation of all the foxes in captivity would be, at a moderate price: 642 old silver blacks at \$7,500 each \$4,715,000 638 young silver blacks at \$6,000 each 3,828,000 1,155 other grades at \$100 each 1,155,000 Total \$9,998,000

Add the value of ranches and the total value of the industry is easily over \$10,000,000.
