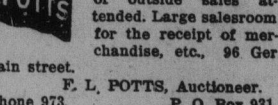

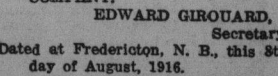

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Homestead must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) in certain conditions.

1. Live stock may be homesteaded in good standing may occupy a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.

2. Cattle—Six months residence in each of three years after settling in homestead and no other cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent is obtained.

3. Live stock may be homesteaded in good standing may occupy a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.

4. Cattle—Six months residence in each of three years after settling in homestead and no other cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent is obtained.

5. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain conditions. Price \$10 per acre. Duties—\$100 per acre in each of three years, cultivate to same extent as homestead.
