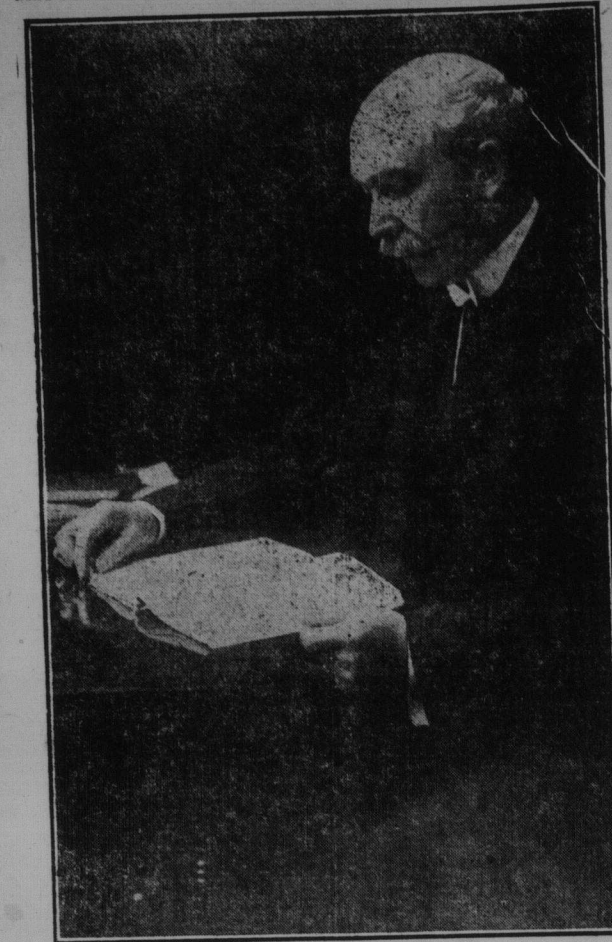


HON. ROBERT ROGERS PRAISES BOYS WHO HAVE GONE TO FRONT

In Inspiring Appeal at Montreal the Minister in Addressing Jewish Audience Calls Upon Manhood of Canada to Support Empire in Hour of Need.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—One of the most inspiring addresses delivered during the great world crisis was that of the Hon. Robert Rogers to the Jews of this city. Hon. Mr. Rogers said: "Already nearly four hundred thousand of the bravest and best of Canada's sons have come forward to press

their services upon their King and upon their country to assist in protecting us from the harness of German militarism. Surely this condition imposes upon us a very deep, a very serious and lasting responsibility, in that we not only owe a common duty in this great conflict to ourselves and to civilization, but, above all, we owe an everlasting duty to the memory of those who have given up their lives to see to it now that their supreme sacrifice on our behalf shall not have been in vain. This, to my mind, is undoubtedly the first duty of every loyal Canadian today, the very neglect of which should rob us of all opportunity to ever perform any further duty. In view of this, I am sure, you approve of the recent appeal to the Canadian people as made by our Prime Minister, as I am sure you also approve of the action taken in the appointment of a National Service Commission, who are clothed with full authority to ascertain, as nearly as possible, the man-power of our Dominion, who should be able to assist in one form or another, so that Canada may, with union and co-operation, render her full share in this great work and in the preparation of plans most likely to assist in the winning of this war in the shortest space of time, and with the surest finality.

All Are Anxious For Peace.

We are all anxious for peace to come, but I have no hesitation in saying that we better have a long war than a foolish, indeterminate peace. A nation holding to such ideals as do the German nation, must be stripped of its power to do harm. It must be stripped also of its ability and power to strew the paths of the ocean with engines of destruction. It must be stripped of its military strength which makes it a menace to its neighbors and the civilization of the world. It must be stripped of its power to work wholesale murder upon sick women and helpless children. No peace will be satisfactory to the world that does not do these things, that does not accomplish these high purposes. And after all, the greatest blessing which could come to the German people themselves today would be their defeat in this war, and the destruction of their oligarchical system of government, under which the people are controlled by the Kaiser and his military circle, and the planting in the German Empire of institutions of government such as we possess, through which the people rule themselves under the protection of that flag which is recognized the world over as the symbol and emblem of liberty and freedom wherever it floats.

England Fighting For All.

And, it is because England is fighting the fight of these free institutions that we in Canada have undertaken our share and our part in the wide field of conflict. I am sure we are all proud of the part so taken by our gallant soldiers, who, by their bravery, have not only won glory for themselves, but have immortalized the name of Canada.

As a western man, I am naturally

ed by each and every individual when considered and settled with his own conscience, that conscience which will tell him whether or not he can afford to remain idle without any share or any part in our great struggle, and hope to expect, with the coming blessing of peace, to be able to enjoy a position of equality in the citizenship of his country, side by side with those gallant men who have gone down into the Valley of Death, there to safeguard for us and for future generations all of that liberty, all of that freedom, all of that democracy which the centuries of the past have won for us.

Canadian Freedom.

It is with pride tonight that I address myself to those assembled representatives, descendants of that great, illustrious warrior, Judas Maccabeus, whose name has been handed down through all ages by reason of his great fight for right and freedom. He realized, I am sure, as do you, his descendants, that the word, "freedom," implies something far more than the mere right to exist. It implies the right to think, to believe, and to practise that religion of your ancestors, which their mothers loved and for which their fathers died. I am indeed not surprised to come here and find the descendants of the Maccabees taking such a distinctive interest in the present war of liberty. Who, more than yourselves, can feel for stricken Belgium? Who, more than you, can better understand the great principle for which we battle? That great principle that "right is right," in which the weak have an equal place, in the family of our existence, with the strong. Through this fight alone we can preserve that great temple of civilization of right and of justice. It is, above all, fitting that those among you physically fit, representing a race of civilizers, should take up arms in defense of that for which the Jewish people in ages past gave up all they had, save that which is after all most worth battling for, their honor and their religion.

Tribute to Defenders.

To you boys that are going to the front, let me say that I cannot find words in this to express my pride at your determination. Your loyalty and devotion to country, flag and to king will earn and will receive the

applause of the civilized world, for to engage in such a fight is a high mission, and those who engage in it will not only have earned the gratitude of their fellow, but they will also have earned a name, the memory of which, like the memory of the Maccabees, will go down through all ages. You will fight side by side with soldiers of our king from all other portions of our great Empire, and you will fight beside that great Jewish General of the British army, commanding a British brigade, General Seligman. You will fight with munitions prepared for you by that honored Minister of Munitions for England, the Right Honorable Edward S. Montague. You can, if you will, I am sure, also meet overseas the Right Honorable Herbert Samuel, Secretary of State for Home Affairs, as well as the Lord Chief Justice of England, Lord Reading, men whose names are known in almost every household in the British Empire, one and all filling with honor to themselves and with satisfaction to everyone the important places which they hold in the councils of the nation. And, more than this, you will meet there representatives of the Jewish people taking their full share and full part in every form of our great war organization as the defenders of human liberty.

Jewish Fighters.

I have seen recently in your local English-Jewish paper, (I do not subscribe for the one in Yiddish), a list of recent casualties of Jewish soldiers from the various Canadian regiments now serving their king and country. It is, indeed, a list of which you may well feel proud, in that it proves that the Jews of Canada, in common with the Jews of all other parts of the Allied world, are doing their share in the present struggle. Let me wish your part in the preservation of that great temple of right for all future civilized mankind.

As I said at the outset, we approach now the crisis of the war. Germany has challenged the Allies to a real show-down in man-power. It is the German belief that their people are more patriotic than we are, and that they will make greater sacrifices. That is why they believe that their four nations can beat our ten. But they are wrong, they are as wrong as they were when they thought the Belgians

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning a vested patent; also 40 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a pre-empted homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.50 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in the quarter-section, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of crop, scrubby or stony land. Livestock may be introduced for cultivation under certain conditions.
