MEXICAN BANDITS KIDNAP AMERICAN CONSULAR AGENT AT PUEBLO, MEX.

Bandits Entered Factory Owned by Agent Bound and Gagged Him and Rifled the Safe—Now Demand a Ransom of \$150,000—Will Do No Harm to Person if Abductors Are Not Followed.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla, Mexico, was kidnapped by three masked bandits last Friday at Puebla, and is being held for \$150,000 ransom, the State Department was advised today.

The American embassy, on inquiry, has been informed by the Mexican Foreign Office that the government would make every possible effort to gain the liberty of Jenkins. The American embassy has been authorized to detail a member of its staff to Puebla to assist in obtaining the agent's release.

The despatch received by the Department quotes the Mexico City newspaper Excelsior as reporting that the bandits entered a factory, owned by Jenkins, gagged and tied the watchman, forced the safe and robbed it of 60,000 pesos, and then took Jenkins away with them. The bandits are reported to have told Mrs. Jenkins that they were rebels and would hold her husband for 300,000 pesos ransom. They said that Jenkins would not be harmed if there was no attempt to pursue his abductors. A business associate of Jenkins has confirmed the newspaper story.

NAT'L ASSEMBLY DISCARDS NAME OF GERMAN-AUSTRIA

Vienna, Oct. 22.—The Nat. Assembly today passed an act abolishing the name of "German-Austria" for the nation and substituting the title "Republic of Austria." The pan-German party offered violent opposition to the change. It is expected that the Finance Minister will report his financial plans and the budget to the parliament tomorrow. The debate on these is expected to begin at once after presentation. The government has ordered a national census to be taken in December.

LATEST TYPE OF TOURIST CARS

One of the Features in Canadian National Railways' Daily Service

Toronto—Winnipeg—Vancouver

The Canadian National daily trans-continental train, Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver made its initial trip from Toronto, with one of the very latest type of steel tourist cars as part of its equipment, the first of an order of twenty such cars in whose construction every point has been considered for the safety and comfort of passengers. This modern type of tourist car with anti-telescopic device is of similar design to the standard sleeping coach, the exception being they are upholstered in leather instead of plush.

Electrically lighted throughout, all berths, upper and lower, are provided with berth lamps. A new feature for this class of car is that lamps have been installed under the seats in the aisles of the car, so that when the ceiling lamps are turned out for the night light may be provided under berth curtains, a great convenience for passengers when going through the car.

Phosphorous push buttons can be readily seen in the dark, should the passenger require to switch on the light or ring the bell, when the berth is in darkness.

A safety feature introduced is a device for holding down the upper berth which precludes any possibility of the upper berth closing when in use. Separate berth curtains are provided so that passengers in the upper berths will not disturb passengers in the lower.

The kitchen has the latest steel range, facilities for washing dishes, and lockers enable passengers to store their food. Lavatories have received special attention, and provide greater conveniences than the older type. An electric thermostatic heating control can be so adjusted as to regulate the temperature of the car, thus preventing overheating.

Thus with the introduction of the daily service of the Canadian National lines between Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver, is the added convenience of the very latest type of tourist cars for second-class passengers who can enjoy a transcontinental trip in every comfort at minimum expense.

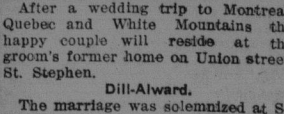
