

SOLDIERS' BOARD GETS WORK FOR 109,493 TROOPS

Cost from April 1 to Dec. 31 Last Was \$27,671,493 So Report Says.

OVER 50,000 MEN IN TRAINING SCHOOL

Seventy Per Cent. of Graduates Able to Follow Line of Teaching.

Ottawa, March 14.—The report of the department of soldiers' re-education for the calendar year 1926, submitted to the House today by Hon. S. F. Tisdale. In the report, which presents a summary of the activities of the department up to December 31, 1926, it is pointed out that the peak load of re-establishment responsibility has been reached and passed, and that more than one branch of the department's work has been completely demobilized. The branches at present in operation consist of five in number: the employment of returned soldiers, training, orthopaedic and two services—administrative, accounting and audit.

Accepts 50,521 Men.

From the commencement of operations by the military hospitals commission the training branch has accepted 50,521 men for training, including 11,574 minors who enlisted under the age of 18 years. In February, 1926, there were 36,022 men undergoing training. At December 31, last, the number had decreased to 4,714.

The after-care statistics show that over seventy per cent of the men who have graduated have been able to follow the line of their training. In February 1926, there were 9,765 patients on the strength for treatment, while on December 31, 1926, there were 6,481. The number of patients treated by the department during the calendar year was 23,391. In addition to these figures outside clinics have been operated and 447,243 treatments given.

Work For 109,493.

The information and service branch, which dealt with employment, was demobilized during the year. The number of men for whom employment was found since February 1926, was 109,493.

The total staff of the department has decreased from the peak level in March 1926, when the number employed was 9,058 to 5,775. In its relation to the employment of returned soldiers the following percentages are given: Service in France 51.2 per cent; service in England only 9.4 per cent; service in Canada only 4.5 per cent; without military service 23.2 per cent. civilians including those rejected and those over and under military age, 6.3 per cent.

The total expenditure from April 1 to December 31 was \$27,671,493.

Lawyer Sore Over Defeat By A Girl

Afraid to Go Home Because Woman Prosecutor Won Case in Court.

New York, March 14.—Samuel Feldman, attorney for Eugene Bell, a negro, who was tried yesterday before Judge Morris Koenig in General Sessions on an indictment charging him with helping to rob a saloon in upper Fifth avenue on the night of December 10, told the jury he had no idea he would win his case, because he was opposed by a woman, and that when he fought girls he always lost. He was right. The jury returned a verdict finding Bell guilty of grand larceny in the second degree, an offence carrying a maximum penalty of five years in prison. He was remanded for sentence on Monday.

Bell was prosecuted by Miss Rose Rosenberg, the first woman assistant District Attorney, and the trial was the first criminal case ever prosecuted by a woman in this country. But in spite of this fact, Miss Rosenberg was not ofsted over her victory in her first case.

"I can never feel overjoyed at another's misfortune," she said. "Of course the public has to be protected, and there is satisfaction in anything that tends to safeguard it, but I cannot say I am really happy over the outcome."

Knew He Would Lose.

Mr. Feldman in his address to the jury dealt largely on the belief he would lose the case because he was opposed by a woman, but before the jury retired Judge Koenig warned the jurors they must decide the case on the evidence and not on remarks made by counsel for either side.

"I won't dare go home if I lose this case," said Feldman. "I won't dare tell my wife that I was beaten by a woman. I don't know why they ever picked on me to try it, anyway. I don't even get any money. It was wished on me by the court and I'm supposed to get my reward in heart on it looks like I'm the goat. With all due respect to the prosecutor, what can she know about this case, anyway. This is about a fight in a saloon. She can't understand what happens in a saloon."

Tactics.

"I don't know, Charlie," she said coyly. "Well, when you find out," the returned lawyer said, "and when the word, will you? I shall be at Mahoe's until ten o'clock. At I don't hear from you by then I am going to ask her."

Liquor Charge In Police Court

Arthur Duffy Pleads Not Guilty to Selling Gin to Sussex Man—Talk of Perjury.

Arthur Duffy, Pond street was charged in the police court yesterday afternoon with selling liquor unlawfully and pleaded not guilty.

Supplied With Gin.

Fred Smith of Sussex stated that he entered the defendant's beershop at about 1:30 Saturday afternoon with a companion known to him as Jack. He asked the defendant for a drink of whiskey and was told that he had none but supplied both him and his companion a drink of gin and later sold him a bottle of gin. The witness paid \$4.50 for the bottle which Duffy passed over to Jack. Later after hearing the drink Jack gave witness the bottle, and it was in his possession when he was placed under arrest by Inspector Evans.

The reason witness was in the St. John police court, he stated, was because he had been requested to appear by the Inspector who arrested him and took him to Hampton.

Inspector Evans.

Louis Baldwin Evans, sub-inspector of Kings County and the city of Moncton, stated that he had placed the witness Smith under arrest Saturday afternoon for having liquor in his possession on the Halifax train. The witness took a bottle from him and the bottle was the one produced in court.

Defendant Pleads.

Arthur Duffy, the defendant was kept to the stand and swore that he did not sell Smith any liquor on Saturday because he did not have any. He did not see the witness on Pond street on Saturday, although he might have seen him before but would not have known him. He had been asked by people who came into his shop, for a drink of hard liquor and had replied that he did not have any. He admitted having sold liquor before but stated that it was six months ago. He swore positively that Smith was not in his shop at 1:30 Saturday afternoon. Smith was recalled and swore that he was in the defendant's shop at 1:30 Saturday afternoon. The case was postponed to next Tuesday at 2:30 P. M.

Stowaways Survive Ship's Fumigation

Ten Young Italians Hid in Lifeboats Refused to be Scared.

New York, March 14.—It is possible the Phelps Line steamship San Giusto to may get away from this port for the Mediterranean without spilling out more stowaways, but some doubt is expressed by the ship's officers, who returned to her yesterday after she had received thorough fumigation that killed all living creatures aboard except ten young Italians ambitious to catch the domain of Uncle Sam without tickets, passports or money. These hardy ten had secreted themselves in the lifeboats and were only slightly affected by the fumigation. As the ship had had a large number of typhus cases and the ten stowaways had been on board several weeks before the fumigation, the ship's officers were sent to Hoffman Island for observation, although the chances of their having any kind of disease are very slim.

The first search of the liner by Health Officer Coffey on her arrival in Quarantine more than two weeks ago revealed the presence of three stowaways, who were sent to Hoffman Island with the steerage passengers. When the ship arrived at the Bush Terminal it was found that the stowaways had been on board for some time. The search of the ship was thorough, and the stowaways were found in the lifeboats. The ship was then sent to Hoffman Island for observation, although the chances of their having any kind of disease are very slim.

Thus in all the San Giusto disgorged fifty-four stowaways, which is said to be a record. All will be sent to Ellis Island after they complete their period of observation on Hoffman Island, and will then be returned to Italy.


