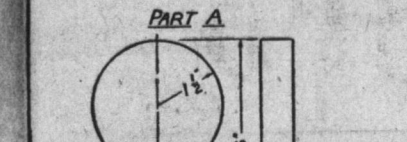

This Peace Day Flag Holder will be found easy to make and will be a good decoration for a bicycle at any time and is more elaborate than an ordinary flag holder. It has a means for holding three different flags and a red, white and blue windmill attached to it.

The windmill has paddles cut differently than the ordinary windmill paddles; they are formed so that one set turns to the right and the other in the opposite direction. By painting the end of each paddle red, the center blue, and the rest of the paddle white a beautiful effect is produced by the revolving paddles when the bicycle is in motion.

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
