


Jane Ng examines some unfinished costumes. Work on costumes begins several moths before a play hits the boards. The costume designer works with the director and the set designer in formulating a consistant visual design.

Concannon, head of wardrobe, does a bit of cobblery. wardrobe department interprets the design of the coses designers, spending up to one week and dozens of the construction of one costume. The wardrobe artment employs six permanent staff and hires up to 10 porces were depending on the show.



Here, Joanna Johnstone irons down part of a costume. Maintainance is also part of the wardrobe department's job. Costumes must be sewed, cleaned and pressed.



Let's start our tour in the costume department. In this photo, Gail Kennedy constructs one of the costumes in the Citadel's current production of *Top Girls*. Depending on the show, up to 200 costumes may have to be bought, borrowed or made. For example, *Pieces of Eight* had 250 costumes, *The Tempest* 65 and *Top Girls* only 35.
