

a part of the Bark with which the store is roofed was found to have been raised but nothing at that time was missing from the store about the 9th of April Serg^t M^cGlachan reported to Mr. Anderson that he had found some goods near the Barracks which appeared to him to be from the Indian Store and on the store being examined in presence of Ensign Conolly of the 37th Reg^t some grey Cloths were missing. Serg^t M^cGlachan at the same time produced the articles which he had found and which were

10 Yds Grey Cloth
10 Yds Gartering
2th Thread
4th Tobacco
5/8 Yds Scarlet Pattern

This circumstance Mr. Anderson immediately communicated to the Commanding Officer and on the 11th took an inventory of the store. Mr. Anderson states that no violence appeared to have been used to any part of the building and therefore concludes that entry must have been obtained by means of false keys, on the 13th Mr. Anderson reported the deficiencies to the Commanding Officer who recommended him to wait some time to see if the robbers could be discovered.

Sergeant Hugh M^cGlachan of the 37th Reg^t states that in the month of April last he found near the Barracks a piece of Grey Cloth containing about 9 or 10 Yds a small piece of Scarlet Cloth about 3/4 Yds 2th Thread 2 Carrots of Tobacco and 2 Rolls of Tape which he delivered to Mr. Anderson. Serg^t M^cGlachan also states that some time in the Month of Feb^r last a small piece of blue Cloth was brought to him by Serg^t Hyman which he had found concealed in an urn situated at near the Barracks the Cloth appeared to be of the same kind as some blue Cloth in the Indian Store. Serg^t M^cGlachan was present when the Indian store was examined by Mr. Anderson and Lieut^t Moir and saw a part in the roof where the bark covering had been raised.
