New York City reports losses of 3.7 and 1.4 per cent. respectively, as compared with 1914 and 1913, which is a much less favorable comparison than that of recent preceding weeks; but inasmuch as general trade last year at this time was comparatively active, the total at the leading centre is fairly good. A fall-ing off of 6.8 per cent. compared with last year and of 6.2 per cent, with two years ago is reported by the cities outside New York, to which most of the more important points contribute. There is, however, more or less gain over both years at Cleveland, Kansas City and Louisville and a slight improvement over last year at Philadelphia, while at only a few centres is the
