

Getting Twine to the Farmer

IN 1919 the farmers of Western Canada faced a late wheat and oats harvest—and no twine available in many sections. Anticipating a crop failure earlier in the season, agents had not stocked twine as heavily as ordinarily. 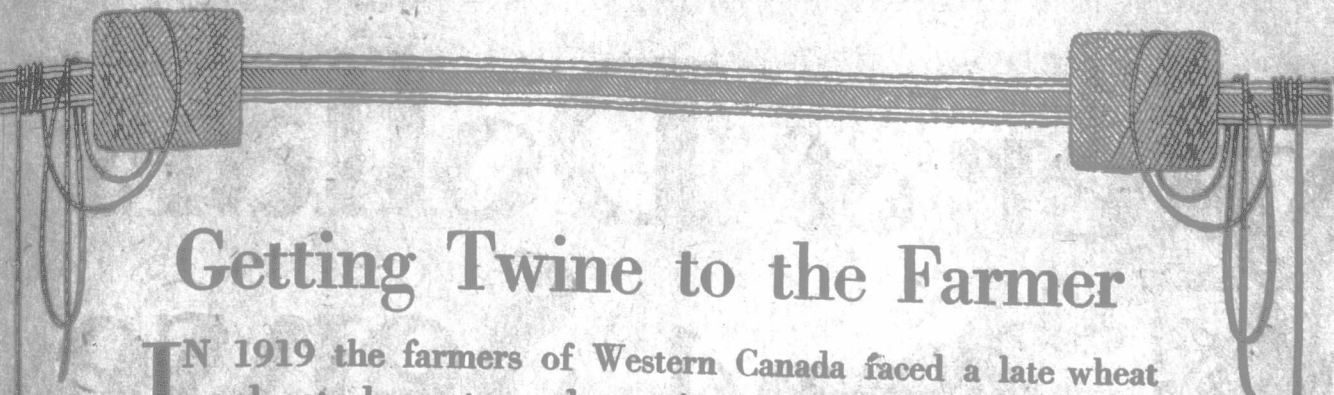
