It cannot but afford us matter of the highest consolation, and gratitude to His Majesty, that at a time when many Parts of Europe, and other Quarters of the Globe are afflicted by the miseries of War, his saithful Subjects in this Province are enabled to enjoy with considence the fruits of their Industry, and to meet in tranquility to consult for the Public Welfare.

To the vigilance of our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to the vigour and enterprize of his Fleets and Armies this Province, in common with the other Dependencies of his Crown, most undoubtedly owes its

The spirit of hostility, and the destructive principles of the common Enemy of all Civilized Governments, still continuing without disavowal, the same measures of precaution, which have hitherto been found so effectually salutary, appear to us equally necessary. We shall therefore forthwith take into consideration the renewal of those temporary Laws, which have contributed to frustrate the machinations of the Emissaries of discord.

We shall likewise take into consideration the means of enabling the Executive Government, to prevent in suture, the introduction of contagious or infectious Diseases by ships coming into our Ports, for which the provisions of the Quarantine Act, have been sound inadequate.
