Mr. Justice Latchford Will Preside--Much Interest In Outcome.

The trial of the Holmedale case in Simcoe, will commence at 1 o'clock on Tuesday.

The plaintiff and her friends will leave on the afternoon train to-day, and Mr. Henderson and his clients will, it is understood, depart on the 10.40 train Tuesday morning. This will land them in Simcoe at 12.10, and will afford time for them to be on hand at the opening.

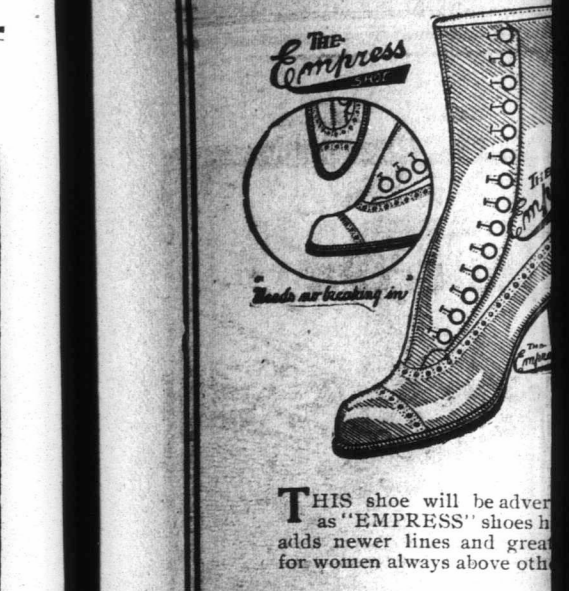
