FOUND BABY ON THE TRACK Child Was Not an Hour Old When Found—North Bay Discovery. N. BAY, Nt., March 13.—A new born baby was found wrapped in an old skirt under a freight car in the Canadian Pacific Railway yard. A workman heard a peculiar noise which seemed to come from a bundle of old clothes under one of the freight cars on a siding and investigation revealed the baby alive and kicking, not an hour old. The child was taken to the hospital and is doing well. Police investigation revealed the astounding fact that the baby had been born out in the open in the freight yard during the noon hour when the engine and the train were stopped and a employee were at dinner. The mother, a slip of a girl of 17 wrapped her offspring in her undershirt, placed it under the car on the repair track, where the workmen would find it on their return from dinner and then walked half a mile to her parents' house.

Travel Through Life Together Two Very Remarkable Cases of Twins—One in U. S. and One in Canada. LANCASTER, Pa., March 13.—The birth yesterday of twins, in both cases a boy and a girl, in the home of Rev. Nathan B. Yeager of Rohrerstown, and the Rev. Albert E. Landis of this city, has called attention to a series of life parallels which are extraordinary. Both ministers are Lutherans, and have been friends from boyhood. They entered Muhlenberg College at the same time and were room mates for four years. They were graduated in the same class and were stationed in Lutheran churches in the same country. They were married on the same day, and the wedding trips were taken together. Their wives were girlhood friends. They entered the Kutztown Normal school together and were the closest of friends throughout their residence at that institution. Like the husbands, both were graduated in the same class, and both took up the profession of teaching, which they abandoned at the same time to become brides.

ALMAS & SON Real Estate Agents and Auctioneers SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any time by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along side his homestead. Pre-emption entry—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of home-plate entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his pre-emption right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. W. W.
