BRURFORD'S NEW POST OFFICE

(Continued from Page 1) with them that day Col. Ross, Chief Post Office Inspector. He was both an able and a courteous man, and would at all times see that the office got everything needed. As Col. Hamner had told them, he had been waiting on in Paris by a deputation representative of both political parties, and after hearing them, he had made up his mind to help them to get what they wanted, if it was at all possible to do so. As to that, the case was good, and he had no doubts. He had heard it said a \$5,000 building would have sufficed. This was ridiculous and he was certain that they all felt as he did, that the money had been well spent. They had not only to build for the Burfordites of the present, but also for those of the future. It should be remembered that four rural mails a day now went out of the Burford post office, and that adequate room was an essential.

Well he had brought the matter to the attention of Hon. Mr. Rogers with favorable results, and he wished to take the opportunity to pay a personal tribute to that gentleman. Mr. Rogers was a high-minded man, held in the highest esteem by the best members on both sides of the House. He must admit that a clerk of the Postal department, when asked to give the Minister the population of Burford, had mistakenly figured 4,500, having quoted the figures for the Township, but that aside, the structure was not one whit too good for the inhabitants of their progressive community. For himself, if the people were satisfied, he felt fully repaid. There were two more things which he thought Burford should

POSTMASTER COX

who by the bye is in his 80th year and still most vigorous, gave some interesting reminiscences of the time when Mr. Van der Post was a good deal larger than Burford. At that period there was a mail to the village once every two days.

President of the firm of Secord and Son, said that he took more than a usual interest in the events of the day, as he used to be a resident of Burford Township. He was naturally pleased to have heard so many compliments passed that day upon the structure. This was the third public building they had constructed, the other two consisting of those at Newmarket and Brantford. North Brant certainly had a most excellent representative in Mr. Fisher.

LT. COL. MUIR.

said that this was certainly a great day for Burford. The public building just opened was for all of them, whereas the armories, to all intents and purposes were for the military alone.
