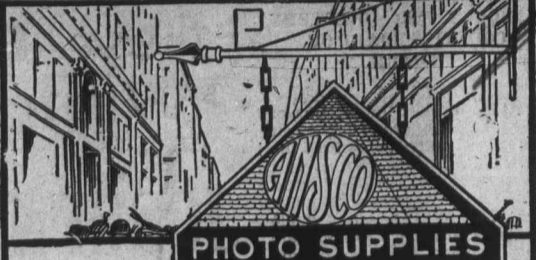

Ottawa, Oct. 8—It is officially announced through the Chief Press Censor's office that the following troops have arrived safely in England: 111th, 130th, 136th, 139th and 146th Ontario Battalions. 150 and 189th French Canadian Battalions. 113th Highlanders Battalion, Alberta; 96th Highlanders Battalion, Saskatchewan; 148th Montreal Battalions; 140th and 145th New Brunswick Battalions. 5th Battery Artillery, Prince Edward Island; No. 8 Battery Artillery, Halifax. Drafts, Horse Artillery, Army Service Corps, Signallers, Royal Flying Corps, naval ratings.

OBITUARY

William Farnham

Another aged resident of Canard has passed to the Beyond. On Thursday morning the death took place at Upper Canard of William Farnham at the advanced age of 88 years. He had been in very feeble health ever since he returned to Canard from St. John over a year ago. Mr. Farnham was formerly a ship's blacksmith and worked at different places. He resided many years at Canard Corner then moved to St. John for a few years. He leaves a wife, a native of Canard, and four children: Mrs. Hattie Gafney of Massachusetts; Emily of St. John; Mrs. D. R. Munroe of Wolfville and John of West Roxbury, Mass. Also two sisters Mrs. Richard Thorne, Digby, and Fraser Dakin of Windsor. The remains were taken to St. John on Saturday for burial by the widow and Mr. and Mrs. John Farnham.

Frank C. Simson

Frank C. Simson, a well known citizen of Halifax, the last remaining member of the once prominent wholesale drug firm of Simson Brothers, died at his residence, 14 Fawcett St., Friday. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon. The deceased is survived by wife and five children. The latter include George, of Kamloops, B.C., Harold, a cyclist at the front, and the Misses Ida, Laura and Marjorie at home. There are a number of Mr. Simson's sisters surviving, one of whom, Mrs. F. G. Curry of Horton, is at present in Halifax. Mr. Simson was born at Horton sixty two years ago, but spent the most of his life in Halifax. For many years the firm of Simson Brothers was one of the largest concerns of its kind in Eastern Canada. A few years ago the concern was absorbed in the formation of the National Drug and Chemical Company of Canada. Mr. Simson remain with the new concern for about a year, then retiring from active business.—Ex

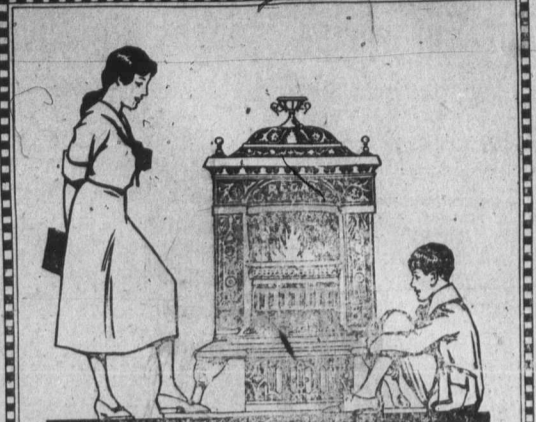
Our school started Monday, the 2nd, under the management of Miss Bertie Chase of Woodville.
