HOME RULE.

(Courier Leased Wire). LONDON, Jan. 27.—The four days' debate on the second reading stage of the Home Rule for Ireland Bill began in the House of Lords this evening. The adoption and the rejection of the measure were mentioned in speeches along familiar lines by the Marquis of Crewe and the Duke of Devonshire respectively.

As the rejection of the bill in the House of Lords is certain and as its defeat will produce no immediate

political consequences, the Upper House was not crowded and the debate was languid.

TO SPARE FRIEND

(Courier Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—In order to spare his old friend, General Daniel E. Sickles the humiliation of arrest, Sheriff Harburger held a conference with counsel for the General to-day, with a view to arranging bail. This would obviate the necessity of locking General Sickles in the Ludlow street jail, pursuant to an order from the Supreme Court issued after the old soldier had failed to account for more than \$200,000 of the New York monuments' committee.

ARE INVESTIGATING

(Courier Leased Wire) NORTH BAY, Ont., Jan. 27.—Mining Inspector Corkhill, has been investigating a number of accidents which have cost the lives of workmen in the mines about Sudbury. Mike Wazny, a trummer at the Creighton Mine, was standing by his car in the open pit when a huge piece of ice hanging on the wall about 70 feet above him became detached and fell, striking Wazny on the head, killing him instantly. The drop into the shafts from the surface freezes in hanging stalactites and the weather has been responsible for several accidents of the kind that caused Wazny's death.

Giovano Busato was killed at the quartz mine while loading ore buckets in the open pit. A large boulder on the surface became loose as a result of the thaw and falling forty feet struck the unfortunate Italian on the head causing instant death. Yalmer Norme, another miner, a Finlander, was killed at Froot Extension Mine, while working at the 450 foot level. A block of wood falling from the surface with terrific force, crushed his head like an egg shell. Norme was 26 years old.
