



WHEN SHELLS FLY

The Residents of Ledysmith have to Dodge.

London, Friday, Dec. 2.-George W. Steevens, war correspondent of the Daily Mail, in a despatch to that paper, covers events in Ladysmith from Nov. 16 to Nov. 20. He says :-

"The siege is degenerating into farce, The sole hardship is the monotony, which has been broken only by one reconnaissance and one night

"On Nov. II a reconnaissance westward revealed the fact that the Boers were weak, It is stated that only 4,000 were disclosed. I believe the number is fewer. "Our guns silenced the enemy's,

which re-opened on our retirement, with a loss of one wounded. The Boer loss is reported to have been forty.
This is probably an exaggeration.
"On Nov. 15, at 12.30 o'clock, a dozen shells fell in Ladysmith, and rifle fire was heard. The troops turned out with the exception of one midshipman, who said he had the middle watch, and did not see why he should be awakened. Nothing followed "On November 17 there was a lang-

uid bombardment. "Yesterday a railway guard was killed, and three, civilians and two natives were wounded. The wounded are

says." The note was signed "Gill-SLAUGHTER OR SURRENDER.

According to Sonnensheim, when Gillmore's launch entered the river, from Baler harbor, under cover of Ensign W. H. Standley's gun, the landing was received with three volleys. Two mortally wounded. Every man was hit, Lieut, Gillmore receiving a flesh wound in the leg, and his foot stuck fast in the mud. It was a choice between surrender and being slaughtered. Lieut Gillmore asked the terms of release. The insurgents proposed that he should procure the delivery to them of the arms and ammunition of the Spanish garrisons, undertaking, if this were accomplished, to send the Spaniards and Americans to the Yorktown.

A sailor of Lieut. Gillmore's party carried this proposition to the garrison. The Spanish commandant replied that it was an insult to Spanish

But the Emperor of China is not 10 Reality.

All Official Appointments are Nominally in his Hands and his Decrees are Regarded as Almost Divine.

All of us who know China, the leading All of us who know China, the leading and most populous country in Asia, and whose empire, leaving out Siberia, covers two-thirds of that vast continent, know that the life breath of its prosperity is precisely its independence of autocracy. Though in name a despotism, the emperor is little more than a sgurehead. All official appointments are nominally in his hands and his decrees are regarded almost as divine, but he has not, like the czar of Russia, an army of docile Tchinovniks to see his decrees carried out and to worry and oppress the people.

A Chinaman, unless in the rare in stances when he is entrapped into a law-suit or caught as a criminal, may spend his whole life without even crossing an official. In the cities he has neither license tax nor house tax nor municipal rate to trouble him. No tax collector calls at his door. He is free to trade and travel where he will; passports are un known. He settles his disputes by the arbitration of his own voluntarily supported guilds. A nominal land tax, a customs entry tax of 5 per cent ad vaorem and a transit tax, or likin, of 21/2 per cent, together with the produce of the government salt monopoly, are estimated to burden the Chinaman with an annua contribution amounting to less than half a dollar per head.—North American Re-
