THE TREE NUISANCE.

Dr. Hall, the Medical Health Officer, agrees we have too many. "Yes, I think there are far too many shade trees in the city," said Dr. Hall, M. H. O., in reply to a Planet query. I have not given the question much consideration, but I should say that on most streets every second could be cut down with advantage. "What is your objection to them?" "Well, they keep the sun and air away, thereby keeping the ground moist. This not only spoils our streets but renders many residences damp and unhealthy. Too many trees are decidedly unhealthy for any city. What people want is the open air."

GOES BACK ON OUR ASS.

Warden Thompson of Labelle, a Life Long Liberal, Declares for the Conservative Candidate.

Montreal, Oct. 15.—Wm. Thompson, a lifelong Liberal, and warden of Labelle county, is supporting Mr. Bourassa, the Conservative nominee. There are eleven hundred English-speaking voters in Labelle, and the great majority of them are expected to do as Mr. Thompson has done, as well as a large number of French Reformers who are not satisfied with Mr. Bourassa. Mr. Thompson wanted Mr. Bourassa opposed at the last by-election, when the Conservatives had offered to support a straight Liberal if one had been nominated. Mr. Thompson invites all independent Liberals to support Mr. Roulin, so as to rid the county of its present member, who, he claims, does not interpret the sentiments of his electors.

REGISTRATION NOW ON

Steady Stream of Would-be Voters at all the Booths--Political Notes.

This is the first registration day. At 10.30 this morning the sittings opened at the police station before Judge Houston, at the old town hall before Judge Woods, and at Harrison Hall before Judge Bell. All day the stream of registration applicants has been steady and the presiding justices have been kept exceedingly busy. The first elector to register was John Ludovick Baillie, who was on hand at the police station when the proceedings opened, and forthwith entered his name. John Rollet, who came in shortly after, was born in 1819, the same year as her Majesty the Queen. At Harrison Hall over 20 applicants registered within the first hour and at the old town hall the work has progressed with equal despatch. A phenomenal trio of electors have expressed their intention of registering together. Their ages are respectively 83, 96 and 97 years and they state their intention of assisting to swell Smith's majority by their ballots. One fact is being brought out at the proceedings, viz., the advisability of the city council numbering the houses, the great inconvenience is caused in ascertaining the location of the applicants. There is one gentleman who is taking a lively and amused interest in the proceedings. Chief of Police Young is convinced that after registration he will be able to add several dollars to the civic coffers in the shape of poll tax.

SERMON ON HELL

A Detroit Preacher Gives His Opinion of the Place.

Rev. Mr. Curran Says That it is a Place of Remorse of Conscience.

At the Detroit Simpson M. E. church, at the evening service last night, a sermon on "Hell" was preached by Rev. Dr. Paul C. Curran, who said, in part: "There are thousands who refuse to believe in hell because of the false teachings of skeptics. The principal arguments against hell are these of annihilation, restoration, and second probation. The truth of future punishment is clearly brought out by the teachings of Jesus Christ. He used the term hell more than all other writers of the bible. "We know that in hell there will be no infants, no laughter, no music, no purity, no love, peace or joy. Hell will be eternal separation from God. Hell will be eternal darkness, hopelessness and despair. The teaching of material fire and brimstone is not necessary, but the idea of suffering is necessary to all conception of hell. "In a positive sense hell will be a place of remorse of darkness, with eternal unrest and discontent. God's love will not save in hell, because those in hell will lose all desire for God and righteousness. There are thousands of people in this world who have hell in their hearts all the time. They live in sin and have not one good desire. They have lost forever all craving after God. "If there is a heaven for the redeemed, the pure, good there must be another and separate place for the impudent, the impure and the wicked. "Jesus Christ came into the world to save men from their just punishment for sin, and all that accept of Christ will be saved, for God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believed in him might not perish but have everlasting life."

STOP THE BOODLING.

Warning of a Liberal Delegate at a North Waterloo Convention.

Berlin, Ont., Oct. 15.—In the North Waterloo Reform convention no one wanted the nomination. The two names mentioned as likely to go before the meeting were those of George Moore, Waterloo, and Conrad Bitter, barrister, of Berlin, and secretary of the Reform Association. Moore was a stronger man, and had far the larger number of supporters in the convention, but he refused emphatically to stand, did not give any reason, but said he would not be averse to accepting the candidature for the local house. The feature of the afternoon was the warning sounded by Candidate Fish, of Linwood, who told the party to shun the political heelers who had disgraced the riding and brought trouble to them in the provincial elections as they would vipers. It had been a great mistake to have them last time. Mr. Bitter, in accepting, said he did not want the nomination, and could ill afford to stand the campaign, but, as there was no one else, he finally accepted. Mr. Bitter is considered by the Conservatives not to be a dangerous man.

GAINS NOW EVEN.

Liberals Pick up a Couple More Seats.

But Lord Salisbury's Majority is Still Overwhelming in the British Parliament.

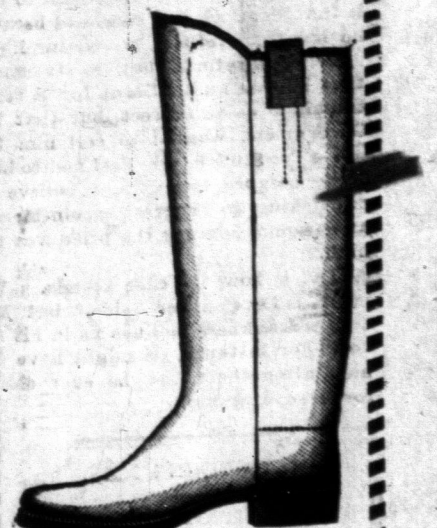
London, Oct. 13.—The only elections received to-night are those from Crewe and Invernesshire. Both show Liberal gains. The Ministerialists have thus far elected three hundred and ninety-eight of their candidates, while the opposition have elected two hundred and fifty-eight. The gains and losses now exactly balance, making the respective strength of the parties the same as it was at the dissolution, which result is not likely to be materially changed by the returns from the bakers' dozen of constituencies still unknown.

The Liberals win Skipton and Spalding and the Conservatives win Gainsborough. The most interesting result to-day, was at Newmarket, where Col. Harry McCalmont (the well known sportsman, and former owner of the fine steam yacht, Girajda), who is fighting in South Africa, defeated Chas. Day Rose (who was at one time a prospective challenger for the America's cup with a yacht to be named the Distant Shore), who is in South Africa, visiting the graves of two of his sons, killed during the war. The elections are virtually completed by the results of pollings announced this afternoon. Seven elections took place to-day, and as many occur next week. The government's triumph is complete, since it retains the immense majority which it had at the time of dissolution. The most that the Liberals can say is that "kicks" has not increased manly enthusiasm, but that it falls short of the majority at the last general election. The usual comments are heard that it will prove an unmanageable majority, and that the government would be stronger and safer if the balance between the parties in the commons were closer. The same morales were drawn five years ago, but the heavy battalions remained session after session in unimpaired discipline. Ireland has gone strong Nationalist, and the Welsh Liberalism has gained ground, but England and Scotland have demonstrated, by a large increase in the Conservative Unionist vote, their sympathy with the Imperialist policies. The United Kingdom at the close of the most important campaign since Waterloo, has taken a broad rather than a narrow view of national obligations and destinies. While there is a good deal of fresh blood in the new parliament, Winston Spencer Churchill is the only young man with promise of potency of a great career, and he is in a fair way to be spoiled by flattery.
