Five Firemen Met Death When The Building Colapsed.

Comrades' Warning Came Too Late for Escape from Falling Walls.

Estimated insurance 145,000 Toronto, July 11.-Between the hours of six and seven o'clock yesterday morning, while yet many of the citizens were wrapped in peaceful slumbers, there was waged one of the fiercest combats with the fiery element recorded in the annals of the city and to-day Toronto mourns the death of five brave firemen who lost their lives in the battle with their grim and

relentless enemy.

The annals of the fire department record no greater loss of life and but few more destructive conflagrations in the history of Toronto, The loss to property is estimated to be in the miles west of Covington at 11.40 neighborhood of \$350,000.
