Ontario's Child Superintendent. Mr. John Joseph Kelso, who is going to Nova Scotia to show the people of that province how to look after their neglected children, has long been propato Nova Scotia to show the people of that province how to look after their neglected children, has long been prominent in child work in Ontario. In 1886 when engaged in work on The Toronto World, he organized the Toronto Humane Society. In 1888 Mr. Kelso established the Toronto Children's Fresh Aid Fund, to provide free picnics and lunches for poor children in the hot weather. Recognizing the need for protecting children from cruelty and neglect, he organized in 1891, the Children's Aid Society, into which the Fresh Air Fund became merged. This society, which was the first of the kind to be formed in Canada, entered upon an agitation for better laws for children, with the result that the Ontario Legislature in 1893 adopted a progressive children's protection act. This act created a state guardianship of neglected and dependent children, and in connection with it Mr. Kelso was appointed Superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children of Ontario
