Newsy Notes

GLEANED FROM VARIOUS SOURCES.

Australia is to adopt a higher tariff to protect the industries that have sprung up during the war.

More geography has passed a given point during the last five years than during the century preceding.

The Government of Canada collected from individuals, on account of the income tax of 1917, a sum of \$6,455,000.

An oil tanker has been struck in the oil areas 81 miles from Montreal; it floated to a height of 70 feet above the ground.

The McMaster Baptist University in Ontario has honored Lloyd George with an LL. D. He has accepted the honorary degree.

By the terms of the Peace Treaty, Poland will become the fifth largest nation in Europe, having a population of more than thirty millions.

It looks as if we were to get a cold-storage plant in the Maritime Provinces. The Federal Government has made a promise to this effect.

The Ozark region of Northern Kansas and southwest Missouri has seen this year more than 2,000 carloads of strawberries, valued at nearly \$3,000,000—a record crop.

Toronto possesses the first serial taxicab in Canada. It is run by T. McLaughlin Neelby, formerly of the R. A. P., and is in great demand by those in search of a new sensation.

A census made by the Catholic Directory printed in New York, says there are 17,549,324 Catholics in the United States; and the Directory people believe that if the floating population of Catholicism was counted the figures would be increased to 19,000,000.

The Allies have agreed to assist in an active campaign against the Bolsheviks. Munitions and supplies will be sent to Admiral Kolchak in his fight against the enemies of Russia.

Lieut. Col. James Layton Ralston, the gallant commander of the 8th battalion, is included in the King's Companion of St. Michael and St. George.

The Presbyterian General Assembly have requested the Government to make the date of Canada's national Thanksgiving the same as in the United States; and not to appoint Thursdays as days of national prayers.

The Protestant Churches of Canada are uniting their forces for a great financial campaign to raise \$1,000,000 in the fall of this year. The Presbyterians, in General Assembly in Hamilton, recognize that \$4,000,000 is their share.

Rat fur may figure largely in findings for coats and trimmings for dresses and suits in London, G. B. The skins, furriers say, will give a thing better than any now had in coats which cost from \$200 to \$300. Such a market for rat skins would help in the extermination of the rodent.

The Committee of the Dominion G. W. V. have past a Resolution assented to by Senator Sir Jas. Loughheed, to be relieved from the position of Portfolios of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and that a Minister be appointed from the House of Commons, and one who was engaged in active service during the war.

American in London were amazed with the quiet manner in which the people took the wonderful achievement of Alcock and Brown. The British views are summarized in the remark of an Englishman who was puffing away at a briar pipe as he scanned the news, in a reply to an American "who said it was great." "Oh, yes," he drawled, unconsciously, "he is an Englishman, and we know he would do it."

A British field gun, which was tested to some extent during the closing stages of the war, has now been refitted to some point that it is said to be considered the best of its kind in the world. It is claimed that the new gun will fire the 185-pound shell in the ordinary quick-fire at a great distance and with more rapidity than has ever been achieved with a field gun before. The range increase is said to be more than 3,000 yards over the old field gun, and the new weapon can discharge twenty-eight rounds a minute.

Some Pies.

Lemon Raisin Pie.—One large cup seeded raisins chopped; turn 1 1/2 cups hot water on them and cook 10 minutes; add a half cup of sugar and 1 egg; add 1 tablespoon flour and juice of 1 lemon; mix this with the raisins; let it cool; bake the pies with a crust; this makes 2 pies.

Buttercrust Pie.—One cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon water, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, piece of butter size of an egg, cook until thick in double boiler; when cool add 1 tablespoon vanilla; bake in deep pie plate with one crust.

Orange Pie.—One orange, juice and grated rind; 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cornstarch, 1 pinch salt, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon melted butter; bake in deep plate with one crust.

Twelve men died in Dawson City recently as the result of eating canned goods imperfectly prepared, and a number of others were made dangerously ill. Potomac poisoning comes from the eating of food unfit for human use. Bacteria are the remedies; but when the distressing symptoms persist, no time should be lost in consulting a physician.

Better, however, to be careful in the preparation of food as a preventive measure. Food of any sort, animal or vegetable, which is kept too long is apt to generate ptomaines. This is particularly the case with meats, fish and canned goods. Thorough cooking before serving such food is essential to safety. But there are uncooked foods in the preparation of which such precaution cannot be taken. Icecream, for instance, has a case of ptomaine poisoning has been contracted from icecream which has been made from doubtful materials or kept too long.

Cement walks should be more important than the showy, costly front porch, which is seldom used except on a warm Sunday afternoon. A vacuum cleaner is much more necessary than the velvet 'parlor set' or showy mahogany mantle. A well equipped, handy kitchen ought to be much more desirable to every housewife than well-furnished showy parlor. Both are desirable, but if something must be sacrificed, let it be the things to show.—R.X.
