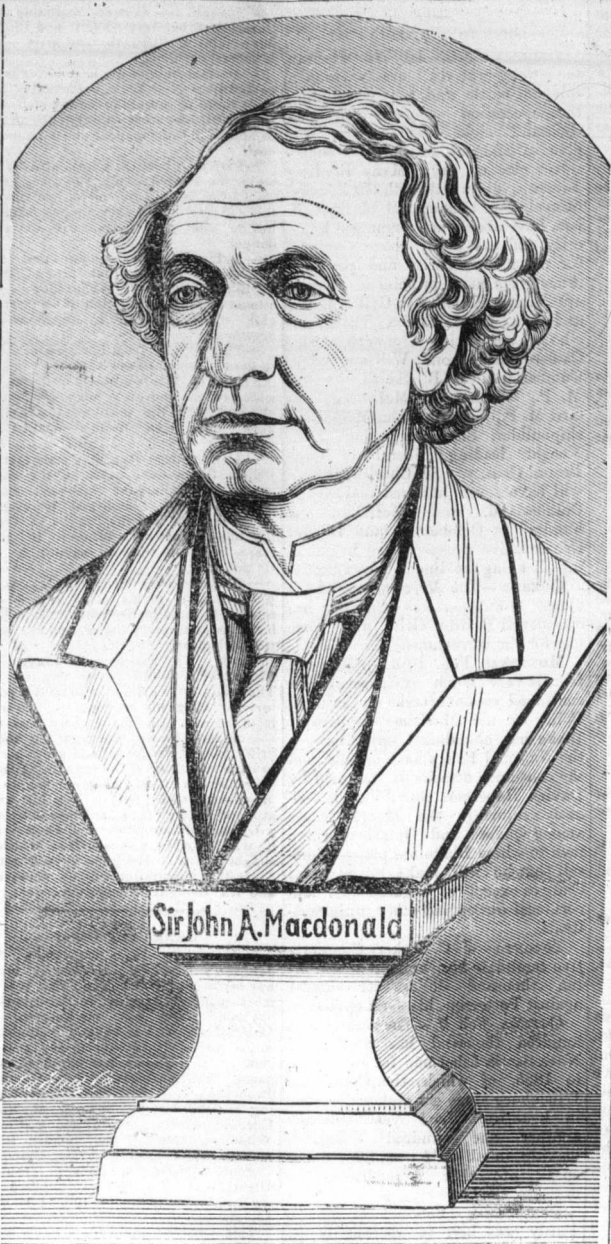

Polling Districts and Polling Places in Westmorland.

Under the new law there are 52 polling districts and the same number of polling places in Westmorland County. For the information of electors we give the following, showing the boundaries of districts and the place for holding polls:

PARRISH OF SACKVILLE.

District No. 1.—All that portion of the Parish of Sackville lying southerly of a line commencing at the mouth of Johnson's Mill Creek, thence following said Creek to the head of Johnson's Mill Pond, thence in a straight line to Westcock Church thence following the Old Burial Ground Road and a continuation thereof to the Bay of Fundy. Polling place at or near Stephen Clark's old store, Wood Point.

District No. 2.—All that portion of the Parish of Sackville lying between District No. 1 and a line commencing at the mouth of the Tantramar River, thence following said River to Dixon's Landing thence in a straight line to Gillis' Corner, thence following the road past Southhouse's and Salem Church to the Lower Fairfield Road, thence following said road to Milton's Mill, thence following Milton Pond and mill stream to the Upper Fairfield Road; thence following said road to the Cross Road near Fairfield School House, thence following said Cross Road to the Road leading from Dorchester past the Copper Mines, thence following said last mentioned road to the Dorchester Parish line. Polling place at or near Albert Palmer's Lower Sackville.

District No. 3.—All the portion of the Parish of Sackville lying between District No. 2 and a line commencing at the Mitten mill stream on the Upper Fairfield Road, thence following said road to the Cross Road near John Smith's, thence following said Cross Road to the Copper Street, so-called, thence following York Street and Bridge Street to Tantramar River, thence following said river until it strikes the mouth of the Upper Mill Creek, thence in the south-easterly direction to the Westmorland Parish line. Polling place at or near Chignecto Hall.

District No. 4.—All that portion of the Parish of Sackville lying between District No. 3 and a line commencing at the mouth of the Upper Mill Creek, thence running in a straight line to the Ogden's Mill Road, thence to a point on the Dorchester Parish line southerly from the Upper Mill Creek, thence following said road to the Cross Road near John Smith's, thence following said Cross Road to the Copper Street, so-called, thence following York Street and Bridge Street to Tantramar River, thence following said river until it strikes the mouth of the Upper Mill Creek, thence in the south-easterly direction to the Westmorland Parish line. Polling place at or near Chignecto Hall.

District No. 5.—All that portion of the Parish of Sackville lying between District No. 4 and a line commencing at the mouth of the Tantramar River, thence following said river to mouth of the Upper Mill Creek, thence following said Creek to the Ogden's Mill Road, thence in a northerly direction to the Dorchester Parish line. Polling place at or near Town Hall, Middle Sackville.

District No. 6.—All that portion of the Parish of Sackville lying between District No. 5 and a line commencing at the mouth of Upper Mill Creek, thence following the Tantramar River, the Lakes and North Brook and continuation of the North Brook to the Parish line. Polling place at or near James Dixon's Corner, Upper Sackville.

District No. 7.—All the remaining portion of the Parish of Sackville. Polling place at or near the Hall in Midgie.

PARRISH OF WESTMORLAND.

District No. 1.—Bounded on the north by the Parish of Botsford, on the south-east by the Bay Verte Shore and on the south-west by Barton Road. Polling place at or near the School House, Port Elgin.

District No. 2.—Is bounded on the east by the Bay Verte Shore and on the north by the Province line, and on the south by the Cumberland Bay, and on the north-west by the Parish of Sackville. Polling place at or near Queen's Corner.

District No. 3.—That part of the Parish on the east side of the Memramook River, south of the south line of the Penitentiary lands, and a continuation of said line east to the Sackville town line, and west to the River. Polling place at the Court House.

District No. 4.—That part of the Parish on the east side of the Memramook River north of Number One, and south of Breen's Creek, so-called. Polling place at or near Middleton Corner.

District No. 5.—That part of the Parish on the east side of the Memramook River north of No. 2, and South of the Lake Creek to the south line of the Pelletier farm, and a continuation of said line southerly to Sackville Town line. Polling place at or near College Bridge Post Office.

District No. 6.—All the remainder of the Parish on the east side of the Memramook River. Polling place at or near Charters' Corner.

District No. 7.—That part of the Parish on the west side of Memramook River, north of the road lead-

ing from Dorchester to Moncton. Polling place at or near McGinley's Corner.

District No. 8.—That part of the Parish on the west side of Memramook River, south of District No. 5, north of the Sylvain Creek (near Alfred Taylor's), and east of the rear line of the Memramook lots. Polling place at or near John B. Gamble's.

District No. 9.—That part of the Parish west of the Memramook River, south of District No. 6, and east of the Pelletier River, south of the Boudreau Marsh, and following the north line of Pacific Garden's land at the rear line. Polling place at or near Jonas Taylor's.

District No. 10.—That part of the Parish east of the Pelletier River, westward of District No. 7, south of Taddy Cormier's Creek, and west of the Base line. Polling place at or near Lewis Richards'.

District No. 11.—The remainder of the Parish. Polling place at or near the Temperance Hall.

PARRISH OF BOTSFORD.

District No. 1.—Takes in all that part of the Village of Tedish from the Shediac Parish line to Friel's Corner, Cape Bald, Little Cape, St. Andrew's Road and Shore Road to Prim Leger's east line; and is bounded on the west by the Shediac Parish line, and on the north by the Northumberland Straits, and on the east on the shore by Prim Leger's east line, and on the south by the Prince Brook, so-called, in Botsford Portage. Polling place at or near the Three Brooks School House.

District No. 2.—Takes in all of Great Shemogue, part of Little Shemogue, Lake Settlement and a part of Botsford Portage; and is bounded on the west by District No. 1, and on the north by the Northumberland Straits, and on the east by the Little Shemogue River and the Chapman mill stream, and on the south by the Parish of Westmorland north line. Polling place at or near Adam Copp's, Bristol.

District No. 3.—Takes in a part of Little Shemogue and all settlers on the Murray Road to Murray's Corner, also all settlers on the north shore road to Stephen Spence's mill stream, and is bounded on the west by the subdivision of David Anderson's and on the north by the Northumberland Straits, and on the east by Stephen Spence's mill stream, and on the south by the rear line of shore lots fronting on the Murray Road. Polling place at or near the School House, Murray's Corner.

District No. 4.—Takes in Bayfield and Cape Spear, and that portion of Emigrant Road from Wesley O'Brien's road to Bayfield; and is bounded on the west by District No. 3 and 5, and is bounded on the north, east and south by Northumberland Straits. Polling place at or near Grand Corner, Bayfield.

District No. 5.—Takes in Emigrant Road, Upper Cape, Bay Side and a portion of Little Shemogue; and is bounded on the west by the Westmorland Parish line and District No. 3, and on the north and east by Wesley O'Brien's road and on the south by the Emigrant Road, on the north by District No. 3. Polling place at or near the School House of School District No. 4, Emigrant Road.

—Except in the matter of a navy our neighbors delight in doing things on a high scale. The highest gigantic project is the erection in Chicago of a mammoth auditorium, excavations for which have already begun. The capital stock of the company which has the enterprise in hand is \$1,500,000, of which two-thirds is already subscribed. The building will be ten stories in height, with three frontages aggregating 709 feet. The ordinary seating capacity of the auditorium will be 5,000, but it is capable of being increased in emergency to 8,000. The stage, which will be furnished with every necessary equipment, will occupy a space of 70 by 120 feet, and will be the largest in the world, with the exception of that of La Scala Opera house in Milan. The need of such an auditorium has often been felt in Chicago, which is a favorite place of assemblage for conventions of all sorts. Several national general conventions have been held there, for six of which temporary buildings were erected at great expense. Buildings have also been put up for four musical festivals, three of which cost \$20,000 and one over \$50,000. During the past five years no less than \$140,000 has been expended in this manner, so that Chicago can fairly claim that she is not actuated solely by a desire to have the biggest thing in this line in the world.

—Three American Presbyterian ministers were looking at the curiosities of the Vatican Museum in Rome in January, before the sarcophagus of Scipio Barbatus, one of them remarked, "How interesting to look upon the effigy of the grandfather of Scipio Africanus!" Just then a New York gentleman, whom the three had met in their hotel, came by, and overbearing the remark, said, "Yes, it must be particularly interesting to you, gentlemen, who are so familiar with Bible history."—Editor of the DRAWER, in Harper's Magazine for February.

—Last year no fewer than 143 divorce and separation cases came before the Scottish Court of Session and the divorce prayer for the year granted in 128 cases, being the largest number on record.

—Secretary Manning informs the United States Congress that it will cost over \$6,500,000 and the services of over 4,000 men to collect the revenues from customs for the next fiscal year.

—The newest sensation of London is an Austrian giant named Winkelmier, whose height is 8ft. 9in., which is over 1 foot more than that of Chang, the Chinese giant.

—Great Britain has twenty houses for female inmates.
