**General Intelligence**  
**BONDS DISAPPEAR.**  
 MONTREAL, QUEBEC, Aug. 30.—Fifteen  
 thousand dollars' worth of bonds of the  
 town of Outremont disappeared yesterday  
 afternoon. The mayor and secretary-  
 treasurer received the bonds in a parcel  
 at the local office of the Bank, and then  
 crossed St. James street to the office  
 of Hanson Bros. When the bundle was  
 opened there, the bonds were found to be  
 missing.  
 The missing Outremont bonds have  
 been traced. Mr. W. Batten, a book-  
 keeper, employed in the Shareholder of-  
 fice, on McGill street, picked them up  
 from the pavement on St. James street,  
 near Mr. Charette's residence. He  
 was located yesterday afternoon  
 through the systematic work of the Cana-  
 dian Secret Service detective, who worked  
 in conjunction with Detective Van-  
 guan, of the city force. Mr. Haynes,  
 the manager, and Mr. McCullough, the  
 clerk of the case themselves, and soon  
 after it was given to them they found  
 the happy result that they found out  
 the name of the man who had stolen the  
 missing bonds. The people who saw  
 this were standing at the time on the  
 Molsons Bank side of St. James street,  
 but as a Windsor street car passed be-  
 tween them and the man, they lost sight  
 of him and had disappeared by the time  
 the car had gone by. After a long  
 search all the surrounding buildings,  
 it was found that the man had entered  
 Fraser, Viger & Co., and there, although  
 he did not know his name, a further  
 search was made and he was located  
 at the residence of St. Hippolyte street  
 where he lived. They learned from his  
 wife that he had brought the bonds home  
 and kept them overnight but had taken  
 them away with him again in the morn-  
 ing.

**SUPERIOR SUNK.**  
 HOON LAHON STEAMER FOUNDERED NEAR  
 BELLE ISLAND.  
 CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 30.—M. A.  
 Bradley, of this city, owner of the steam-  
 er Superior, received the following tele-  
 gram to-day from the captain of that ves-  
 sel:  
 "The Superior sunk on the west side of  
 Belle Island in four fathoms of water.  
 The members of the crew are all safe and  
 are at Charlevoix. The steamer is a total  
 wreck."  
 The Superior was loaded with iron ore  
 and was bound for Toledo. She was tow-  
 ing the schooner Sadsuky and in a heavy  
 gale she became waterlogged, dropped her  
 anchor, and a little later went down.

**A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.**  
 BROCKVILLE, Ont., Aug. 30.—In a  
 friendly game of base ball at Gananoque  
 a few days ago, a peculiar accident occur-  
 ed. Bob Thompson, pitcher, in en-  
 deavouring to throw a swift ball broke his  
 arm above the elbow. As he drew his  
 arm back with great force and swung the  
 ball, it fell to the ground and rolled  
 behind him, and his arm dropped lifeless  
 to his side. The break was caused by a  
 contraction of the muscle.

**KILLED IN MIMIC WAR.**  
 "TROY, N. Y., Aug.—Bernard Owens  
 aged eight, was accidentally killed by play  
 mates. With some other boys he had  
 organized a company, representing  
 American and Spanish soldiers, and had  
 each other in a sham battle. Young  
 Owens fell. Picked up as dead he was  
 buried in a quick-dug grave and re-  
 covered several feet of earth. Subsequently  
 he was dug out and when the body was  
 recovered 12 hours later he was really  
 dead.

**MUTUALLY ATTRACTIVE FAMILIES.**  
 A unique series of weddings took place  
 in the Catholic church at Adolphus  
 yesterday last, when the Misses Hoffman  
 (three) were married to three brothers  
 named Quinn. Two of the brothers who  
 were married were twins and also two of  
 the sisters. One other brother of the  
 Quinn family is already married to a  
 sister of the Hoffmans.

**PRESIDENT MCKINLEY'S MOVE-  
 MENTS.**  
 CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 30.—While  
 President McKinley very much desires  
 to pay more than a brief visit to his  
 old home in Canton, he finds the duties of  
 his office are such that he will be obliged  
 to cut his visit there to a mere call.  
 The president will spend a couple of days  
 in Camp Waukegan, to correctly inform him-  
 self as to the conditions there.
