# WEAPON FOR ANALYST

Immense Strides Recently Made in Science.

#### THE FASTEST MOVING MATTER.

THE FASTEST MOVING MATTER.

London, June 27.—The epoch-making discoveries in science described a week ago are being rapidly developed. Investigations by M. Currie, the French physicist, Sir William Thomson, Prof. Rutherford, Sir William Crookes and Sir Oliver Lodge have carried them into an entirely unknown region in physics and chemistry, where all analogies fall and all accepted views of the mature of matter offer no assistance.

A study, of the radio-activity of the three new elements, radium, thorum and uranium, shows that three kinds of rays are emitted. One kind consists of radially projected atoms of matter which are thrown into space at the stupendous speed of 30,000 miles per second.

These particles emitted by radium are one thousand times more massive than negative electrons, which are also thrown off at a similar speed, and which have long been known under the name of radiant matter. They are positively instead of negatively charged, and, moving faster than the fastest flying star, are the most rapid-moving matter known.

This property of radio-activity has placed a new weapon in the hands of the chemical analyst as superior in delicacy to the existing methods as those of spectroscopy were when introduced forty years ago. Matter in quantities invisible under the microscope, may now be quantitatively investigated.

Berlin, June 28.—A medical writer in the Frankfurter Zeitung gives some curious particulars about the white lines which cross finger nails. These are signs of disturbance in the organism at the time they were formed. They often form during serious lilness.
