GEOLOGICAL.

Highly Interesting Meeting Was Last Held Evening.

The geological section of the Hamilton Scientific Association met last night. A. T. Neill in the chair. The attention of the section was directed to the discovery of some very large bones in German East Africa belonging to the extinct Gigantosarins Augustus Africanus. Prof. Fraas showed the bones of the hind legs to be 11 feet 6 inches long, the pelvis 3 feet 3 inches in diameter, while the spine exceeded by one-third the length of that of any animal yet found. Attention was also called to the discovery at Toronto of foot-prints in the blue clay, found in the battom of the bay or 70 feet below the bottom of the bay or 70 feet below the water level. These footprints may date back over 50,000 years. This is considered the most important find. Col. Grant showed a large number of fossils which he obtained during the last collecting senson from the Niagara upper chert, including Cambriosilvarian shingle at the beach and Winona. Many of the specimens were well presented and some new to science. The number of fossil sponges collected was large considering the limited territory and two specimens were new, Col. Grant informed the vection that he was able to procure complete. The number of fossil sponges contected was large considering the limited territory and two specimens were new. Col. Grant informed the vection that he was able to procure complete specimens of fossil sponges from the rock cutting east of the reservoir and sent one each to Prof. Chapman and the late Dr. Billings. Each individually came to the same conclusion that the specimen sent were fossil sponges. This, he thought, was the first discovery of fossil sponges in Canada. Col. Grant then read his paper entitled "Notes on the Late Collecting Season, Continued." He said he never remembered the water being so high in the lake as during the month of June, 1908, and that the water had encroached on the land, washing down the soit, and no less than twelve actual forest trees lay prostrate upon the shore. The farmers attributed this to a great storm which took place before his arrival, but the effect was largely increased by the greater body of water being hurled a ainst the embankment. He said that the most reasonable solution was owing to the slight uplight of the land forming the northeastern shore of Lake Ontario, because the lake levels of Erie and Huron were not so high, comparatively the extra water supply cid not come from that source.

The section adjourned to meet subject to the call of the chairman.
