Have our readers seen A. Willard's Butter Machine? If they have not, let them, especially the rural part of them, step into the Royal Agricultural Society's Warehouse and examine it closely, they will find their labour well paid for by the gratification it will afford. It is almost impossible to give an intelligible description of it in words, but of its powers nothing is more easily done. It is in appearance a box churn but the dasher is altogether different from those in common use. The cream being put in, there is a thermometer which is marked with a number indicating the temperature it ought to be brought to, in order to cause the butter to separate with the greatest facility. In summer, cold water is poured into an outer case, and in winter warm, until the mercury indicates that the proper temperature has been attained. The winch is then turned for a few minutes and the butter is made; a stop cock, at the bottom of the machine protected by a strainer, allows the butter milk to be drawn off; water is then poured in and the butter is thoroughly washed, and the milk to be drawn off; water is then poured in and the butter is thoroughly washed, and the butter milk pressed out by merely a few revolutions of the machine: in like manner the pickle is poured in, and the butter salted or rather preserved.
