THE great increase of beggars and mendicity of all sorts that has taken place in Charlottetown within the last few years, is one of the inevitable results of the tast tew years, is one of the inevitable results of the increases of populations and augmentation of wealth. But a few years since, there was scarcely a papper, properly so called, to be found in Charlottetown;— the case, we are sorry to any, is saily altered; there are now too many, by a great deal, for the size of the

are now too many, by a great deal, for the size of the place. Much of this, we fear, is caused by indiscri-minate almsgiving. It is one of the blessed dispensa-tions of a Frovidence which always works for our our good, though sometimes in very mysterious ways, that the principle of pity and compassion is univer-sally diffused; the wish to relieve the needy, the de-sire to alleviate suffering, is far more general than many people are aware of. It is one of the instincts of our nature; but the misfortance is, that, like all instincts, unless properly regulated, it is as likely to lead us into doing evil as good. For indiscriminate charity, by giving to the impostor, not only fosters and encourages profligacy and crime, but is an actual robbery of the unfortante and deserving poor, inas-much as what is given to the former, lessens by so much as what is given to the former, lessens by so much the fund to which the latter has the only just

claim. We place the unfortunate in the only just olaim. We place the unfortunate in the first rank, not only because they are the most numerous, but because they, in this country at least, are almost the only objects of charity and compassion. There are a few of the latter, comprising chiefly widows and or-phase, and those who, from old age and want of connexions, and by neither vice nor improvidence, are reduced to a state of destitation, from which they

When these questions shall have been decided in the affirmative, another will accessarily spring from the decision, viz: What kind of Bank shall be the decision, viz: What kind of Bank shall be established—a private Joint Stock Bank, with an un-limited individual responsibility.— or a Chartered Bank, the responsibility of the members of which shaft be limited to the amount of the shares held by small be institled to the amount of the same sheat by each member of the Corporation ? We would respect-fully suggest, that there could be no better time for holding a public meeting on this subject than the pre-sent, at which the two first questions might be freely liscussed. It would appear, we think, clearly manifest, that

It would appear, we think, clearly manifest, that the institution of a Bank is importively called for, if the commerce of the Island is to be put upon an equal facting with those of the surrounding colonies. The internal commerce of the country also requires that the same advantages should be held out to our farmers and traders as are enjoyed by the like classes farmers and traders as are enjoyed by the like classes in every country that is at all in an advanced state of civilization. There are a great many persons in dif-ferent parts of the country who are actually in want of a safe place in which to deposit their money, and, what is more to the purpose, this money is lying idle, productive noither to the holder nor any one else; whereas if lodged in a Bank, it would be immediately put into circulation and be productive of profit to the person who lodges it, the Bank, and him to whom it is advanced by the Bank. Bat the great benefit which we would anticipate from the meeting of persons interested in the matter, would be, the ascertaining whather there are a a sufficient number of persons wilinterested in the matter, would be, the accreating whether there are a sufficient number of persons wil-ling to join in such an association;—for that there is a sufficient surplus capital seeking employment, we have not the least doubt of; nor do we doubt, also, that such a meeting would be well attended, and that

that such a meeting would be well attended, and that the benefits and advantages of the introduction of the banking system would be fally made manifest, and that a sufficiency of capitalists would conse forward; and it would be for them to say, what should be the nature of the institution. We should profer to see a chartered Bank, under proper restrictions-we mean such as have been found useful and necessary to pre-

serve the interests of the public, while they have not interfered with the salutary action of the Bank, nor the fair profits of those who have embarked their capital.
