To stand by the sailor and the soldier who stood so faithfully by them in the dark year of war, is the obligation that rests upon every Canadian. One of the Organizations whose duty it is to keep alive this spirit of helpfulness and fidelity is the Navy League of Canada, it is doing a great work for the sailor and for the families of the sailors, both of the Navy and Mercantile Marine, and should be heartily supported.

In St. John its labors find expression very largely through the activities it has been rendering through the Seamen's Institute, in looking after the sailors passing through the Port, as well as in the financial aid, that it giving to the widows and families of sailors.

No fewer than 35,000 sailors were handled at the St. John Seamen's Institute during the past winter.

With an increase of Port business and an increase in the number of sailors, the St. John Branch of the Navy League finds itself under the necessity of considering the enlargement of the Seamen's Mission building which will mean quite a large expenditure.

Fredericton has a very active Branch which has been most helpful to the sailor.

Other communities that have shown an interest in the objects of the League in the past are: Moncton, Woodstock, Sussex, Eggleston, and Chatham. A renewal of their interest is greatly to be desired.

The New Brunswick Branch of the Navy League has lately elected R. E. Armstrong, of St. John, as its President, and C. B. Allan, Secretary.

If there are communities in the Province that would like to participate in the work that the Navy League is doing, information with regard thereto would no doubt be cheerfully supplied by these officials.

New Brunswick is the last Province that should forget what it owes to our sailors.
