I. W. W. ALLEGED TO HAVE HAD BOMBS

Report aid before U. S. Government Agent.

NEW YORK, June 10.—A report that investigators in Bessemer, Pa., had learned from a woman informed details of the bomb plot which started the nation with a series of explosions early last week was laid today before William J. Flynn, government agent in charge of the anarchist hunt.

It was learned that Flynn was considering the report. It was not known what action, if any, he would take to confirm the story.

The report was that detectives in Bessemer learned the bombs were made there, of iron piping and dynamite, stolen from plants nearby, and that a gang of I.W.W. met there on May 27 and departed with the bombs in suitcases.

BOMB FOUND

PHILADELPHIA, June 10.—Police are today investigating the finding of another supposed bomb in the north eastern section of Philadelphia yesterday.

The bomb, crude in form, was found by an unidentified man and turned over to the police authorities, who today will hand it to Frank Ford, arsenal explosive expert, for examination.

The officers scoured the Bessemer section all day Saturday, but found no trace of the bomb plant.

According to Edeburn, the woman who questioned admitted that she had made false statements to the Bessemer police and knew nothing of the anarchists' rendezvous.
